2020 Achievements

The Covid year

In any normal year we would state with pride runs scored, wickets taken, competitions won and county and district representation for our young cricketers. Some of this is repeated at the end of this report but the primary achievement in 2020 was the coming together of a small group of volunteers who worked tirelessly to provide cricket and training for our young cricketers.

The statistics detailed below are frankly outstanding and the club owes a huge debt of gratitude to (in alphabetical order)

The Covid pandemic effectively closed the club from mid-April to mid-June. On 21 May we were allowed to open the nets on a restricted basis, on 8 June small group coaching commenced and on 26 July junior matches commenced.

In the period 8 June to early September the Club delivered a full season of young cricketer activity in a period of just 10 weeks. The statistics below indicate the intensity of the programme that was delivered.

- 31 paid coaches were employed by the club delivering 2,226 hours of coaching over a 12 week period. Four of the YCs at the club assisted under the DOE project.

Five of those detailed above have come through the youth structure at Esher.

- In the summer holidays 39 days (348 hours) of holiday camp coaching were delivered.
- 233 matches were played in the U6 to U15 age groups between 26 July and Mid-September at the rate of 30 per week.
- Three all day tournaments arranged at New Road.
- The girls section increased from 102 to 123 during the season, had 5 weeks of Zoom training during lockdown and played 26 friendly matches.
- The boys section had 363 members in the U5 to U19 age groups.
- The senior Academy played 16 matches winning the Surrey T20 for the first time and reaching the play-offs in the league.
- Net booking system up and running within six days of being notified of the required and not straightforward Covid protocols.
- Following the cancellation of YC league cricket the Esher team established their own league inviting other local clubs in the U8 to U13 age groups.

The net effect of the above is that we delivered a full season of cricket to our young cricketers in a period of 11 weeks which we would normally undertake over 22 weeks, all in full compliance with the Covid related restrictions imposed by the Government and the ECB.

First I would like to offer my sincere condolences to any of our members who have lost loved ones during the ongoing Coronavirus pandemic and to acknowledge the incredible work which continues to be carried out by NHS staff, key workers and carers.

In such difficult times, if anybody had said to me in April or May that we would run a full programme of coaching sessions for our young cricketers, many in small groups of five with one coach, play over 260 matches, run summer courses, have a record number of boys and girls, start a ladies section, play a full part in the senior youth Development league and U19 T20 competitions, play 35 adult matches, put out a fifth XI and organise structured cricket for U9 to U13s in our part of Surrey, you could reasonably have wondered just how many Red Bulls they had been drinking.

In every way, 2020 was a remarkable season, and as a cricketing community we owe a huge debt to those volunteers who enabled such joy, joy beyond our most optimistic hopes, to happen.

I make no apology for making special mention of some of these people, but I do apologise if I missed anybody out. In truth everyone helped Esher make the best of the situation, from players, to Age Group Managers, to parents, to volunteers, supporters and those involved in club management. So here goes:

- Duncan and Lek for all their hard work, much of it unnoticed. Duncan led an especially buoyant programme of winter nets and summer courses.
- Alisa French for working incredible hours to dream up, organise and manage cricket for U9s to U13s from 9 clubs, ensuring appropriate match ups and above all fair and equal participation for everyone!
- Andy Nendick for finding grounds for 260 Esher matches. That is a major effort. Andy is retiring from this important role. Please raise a hand if you can help.
- David Reed for tirelessly and sensitively making sure we followed Health & Welfare guidelines so that everyone was able to be in a safe environment.
- Carolyn Lenton for running girls' cricket. We now have at least 123 girls from U5 to U15!
- Glenn Harrison for running 20 matches for the Development and U19 XIs. Esher won the U19 T20 for the first time, a super achievement with exciting wins over old friends and rivals Sunbury, East Molesey and Spencer on the way.
- AGMs and their army of supporters, umpires and scorers.
- Our young coaches. This community of 17 to 23-year-olds did a terrific job, inspired the young cricketers, became close friends and enjoyed playing cricket together.
- Club management. We say special thanks to Jonathan Manuel and Matt Sabben-Clare who have been excellent Treasurer and Secretary respectively and are both stepping down at the AGM.
- John Woollhead for Captaining the third XI and chairing team selection. John is stepping down and Charlie Winder is taking over as 3rd XI Captain and Glenn Harrison as Chairman of Selectors.
- Captains Will Edwards, who spearheaded a successful fundraising day, Alex Mason and Chris Burton.

Finance

Given the circumstances it would be fair to ask how well or badly the club managed financially. It is hard enough keeping our heads above water at the best of times and this year we were set, what I hope is a one off, unique series of challenges.

Fortunately, our efforts to raise funds in previous years meant that we started with some cash in the bank, thereafter it was a case of swings and roundabouts.

- On one hand, an Elmbridge grant was helpful, government initiatives permitted sensible cost management, membership numbers were good, and the nursery continued to contribute.
- On the flipside, club hire, social and fundraising events were not possible and bar usage suffered, I sincerely hope we will be able to bring these excellent events back into the calendar next year. The annual ball is set for Saturday 11th September at Imber Court. It was a difficult time for our sponsors, many of whom had to tighten their belts. Special thanks to Rowan Preparatory School, Sporting Wine Club, and of course Andrew Dewar and his team at Curchods and to all those who have advertised in this report.
- I would also like to thank all those who have volunteered, donated, organised and supported the club in whatever way.

Facilities

Despite the unusual year, our desire to improve facilities is strong. The New Road ground needs to be protected and improved in order that we can optimise use. In the close season we plan to install a sprinkler system so that the squares can be in the best shape possible. In addition and with effect from April 2021 we have secured Imber Court on a long term basis, see page 8 for details.

Chairman's highlights

It gives me great joy to watch cricketers of all ages having fun. There was plenty of that this summer. Home Grounds Update

New Road

We are all familiar with ground at New Road, I would argue (I would, wouldn't I) one of the best grounds on the circuit.

You may not be aware that in 1935 the Martineau family sold the freehold of the ground to the Club for the princely sum of £2,750, a significant discount on the going rate at the time. The freehold was placed in the custody of Barclays Bank's trust company to hold title to the ground on behalf of the Club and to ensure compliance with the various terms of the deeds. More recently, Zedra inherited the role of custodian trustee from Barclays as part of a much larger acquisition of trust businesses from Barclays.

In 2017 the Club were notified by Zedra that they were withdrawing from this segment of the custodian trustee market and were no longer able to provide trustee services to the Club. This was a strategic decision by Zedra and applied to many similar sports Clubs, not just Esher.

Since 2017 the management committee at Esher have been exploring the structure by which title to the ground should be held, with the objective of ensuring that all interests are protected and as far as possible the status quo is maintained. Suitable advice has been sought from PwC (tax) and Munday's (legal) throughout.

Early in 2020 the management committee concluded on its recommended approach, whereby two companies limited by guarantee would be formed to replace Zedra's role, with the purpose of acting as trustees holding title to the freehold asset. Despite the restrictions imposed by the pandemic the process was progressed during 2020 with an EGM held in December 2020 to approve the structure. The companies were incorporated in February 2021 and we expect the required court approval process to complete later in 2021 at which time the revised governance structure will be fully implemented. The Club will remain the beneficial owner after completion of this process, as it always has been previously.

The Board of the two companies is drawn from current or former members of the management committee, namely Geoff Ellis, John Woolhead, Vince Chandler and Nicholas Page, and the

members all have long-standing association with the club, namely John Bentley, Andrew Bernard, Kevin Chester, David Crook, Neil Fletcher, Sal Lalani, Alastair Lawson, Jim Steven and Jules Winder. I know that all these individuals have the best interest of the Club at heart and we can rest assured that both the structure and personnel within that structure will look after the asset and ensure cricket will be played at New Road for many years to come.

Finally, I would like to thank Matt Sabben-Clare for leading the project and David Crook for his legal input. This wouldn't have happened without the tireless work and effort put in by both Matt and David. Thank you.

Imber Court

Many of you will be familiar with Imber Court having played YC matches or 3rd XI cricket there. We have had use of the facility since 2007.

Following discussions late in 2020 we have secured a long-term arrangement whereby we have exclusive use of the whole cricket facility incorporating two squares, the nets and the pavilion. This will provide us with much needed extra capacity for both YC training and matches and enable us to run up to six XIs on a Saturday afternoon. We are currently busy upgrading the square and making sure the ground has the required equipment to meet our needs. This is a fantastic addition to our offering, and I am sure will be used to its full capacity.

Not only do we have full use of the cricket facility but the bar and café in the main clubhouse will be available to spectators and players.

It is planned to hold (Covid restrictions allowing) the end of season Ball in the Imber Court function room on 11 September 2021.

When the first lockdown came in March, we spent a significant amount of time re-working our forecasts on the basis that the 2020 season would be cancelled and with the objective to make it through to what would we hoped would be a normal season in 2021. The fact that we have ended the 2020 season with more cash in the bank than when we started and with a lower than anticipated loss on the income and expenditure account is a strong result and testament to the hard work of the club staff and volunteers to get cricket running in a Covid compliant manner, supported by an army of young coaches and of course the support of the club's cricketers and parents. Special mention also to Martin Burnett who steered us through the furlough maze with income of £21.9k supporting up to nine members of staff March to July, alongside a much increased and more complex payroll. Otherwise, to continue with the focus themes of the last five years:

1. **Cash flow.** During F20 we generated £7k of operating cash, a great result that means that not only can we safely navigate the traditional post season low period, but also continue our programme to improve the facilities and infrastructure of the club.

2. **Reduced Losses.** Unfortunately we have moved back into the red after a rare surplus last year, but given the circumstances, particularly with:

- The cancellation of our key fundraising events: City Lunch, the Ball and Vince's lunch
- Reduced bar usage
- Minimal rental income
- The loss of 90% of sponsorship income

This is a creditable result and certainly significantly better than our expected outcome at the end of March. Key positive contributions that helped limit our fall income to 7% include a £10k government grant as part of Covid support to small businesses, furlough income, another year on year increase in junior cricketer numbers and a significant uplift in net course income, with very strong attendance at our summer courses as people stayed local over the summer.

On the cost side of the equation, we have a 21% reduction in staff and player costs due to the early season lockdown and due to the absence of adult player fees. However, our cost reduction is limited to 4% overall as we have invested in extra coaching capacity to support junior cricket and ensure Covid compliance, and we have increased administrative costs with increased bank charges due to increased use of Paypal and due to continuing legal and tax fees related to the potential change in the ownership structure of the club's grounds.

One further point to note is that, following a full review of depreciation, we have identified that due to take on balances in the years ended 30th September 2009 and 2010 and some accounting entries thereafter, depreciation has been overstated and assets understated. The net change is described in note 3 to the accounts and does not impact cash.

3. **Infrastructure and Capital Investment.**

We have continued to invest in club facilities with two new batting cages and an initial deposit on a new irrigation system that was paused due to lockdown but thanks to our cash position has been completed following the end of season.

4. **Process Improvement.** We have continued to extend the use of on-line payment and this year, on the back of Covid requirements, moved to a cashless bar that has also streamlined our back office activity; we propose to continue with a cashless bar in the future. We will continue to look at how we can improve time consuming back office activities while at the same time helping our members.

Finally, this is my last year as Treasurer and I am pleased that, despite the significant challenges we faced in year ended 30th September 2020, Esher Cricket Club remains relatively robust financially and I'm sure that, once we return to some form of normality, the Club will continue to flourish. Meanwhile thanks to Nouman Hashmi who has agreed to take over as Treasurer and I wish him well!

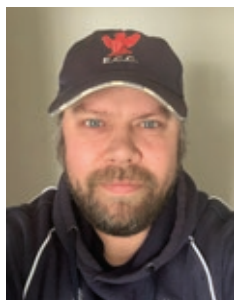

Senior Boys Academy (Under 16-19: Glenn Harrison)

The creation of the Senior Academy in 2020 was aimed at pooling the talents of three strong year groups and ensuring that the season's structure was organised to optimise playing competitive cricket, avoiding fixture clashes and providing the ability to play on good pitches without duplicating requests through 16s, 17s and 18s which had historically been problematic and had potentially hampered cohesion between the top junior years. Andrew McCallum led the side by example and after winning a tough group (Wimbledon, Spencer and Sunbury) we managed to qualify for finals day and win the ECB Surrey cup for the first time in Esher history – the team got better and better through the day and match winning exceptional batting by Andrew McCallum and bowling by Freddie Harrison was superbly supported by tremendous all round performances by Adam Koep, Ollie Baker and Brandon James – this was backed up by superb catches and keeping by

Joe Moss that made us comfortable winners in the final, following a tougher semi against Valley End. It should not be forgotten that the key moment of the season was possibly Charlie Green's fifty in a must win game against Sunbury – he destroyed a decent attack that included a county spinner and his score off 18 balls made it near impossible for us to lose. Jack Fletcher bowled superbly throughout the campaign with pace, movement and bounce and impressed enormously. Jack has the potential to be a great leader in the 19s next season and play in the top adult teams.

The Sunday Trust team was made up mostly of the 19s squad, which was galvanised and brought together by Charlie Winder who did a sensational job as Captain. Despite this being a very challenging year, a huge thanks to all boys and parents for the tremendous commitment and support. Without all your help, we would not have such a fantastic group. This year we had 42 boys across the two-year groups coming together to train and play matches as a Junior Academy. This proved to be an enormous success, with both age groups integrating seamlessly and the U14s benefitting from the extra year of experience of the U15s. We were able to rotate the captaincy between 4 people, regular captains Rohan Gupta and William Malet de Carteret were joined by Ben Clarke and Ben Frewer.

The season started with small group training; from which the boys hugely benefited allowing skill to develop and new friendships to form across the age groups, which bodes well for their future development into adult cricket. Once matches were allowed, a range of matches were scheduled with local clubs to allow boys to put all the training into practice. All in all, we played 16 matches including:- Weybridge U16s, Barnes CC, Thames Ditton CC, T20 Academy, East Molesey CC, Spencer CC, Richmond CC, Reigate CC, Ashtead CC and Stoke d'Abemon, which created some memorable moments for all who attended. Although it was hard to single out any particular moment, I would like to highlight the following performances:

- Josh Da Vall (15no) and Rahul De Silva (17no) winning 8th wicket partnership of 36 off 31 against the T20 Academy
- Sam Slaney's 43 not out in the unsuccessful run chase against Weybridge U16s and 53 not out (off 36) in the defeat to Ashtead U14s
- Joe Goodsman 3-15 as he destroyed Spencer's middle order before the retirement of both James Page (31 off 19) and Jack Joyce (30 off 20)

as we chased down Spencer's total with 3 overs to spare

- Rahul De Silva remarkable quicker yorker (after just been hit for six) to bowl Ashtead's U15 captain, followed by Tom Reed's 32 off 33 to comfortably guide us to victory
- Four batsmen retiring in the win against Richmond U15 (Rohan Gupta (30 off 25), Christian Nicolaou (32 off 26), Matt Nolan (32 off 33) and Alex Morcombe (30 off 14)

Under 12 (Alexander Rawlinson)

The summer of 2020 was like no other. The season was eventually given the go ahead and we had 34 young cricketers for 15 weeks of quality coaching. Duncan and Alisa set about creating Esher Covid leagues and we arranged 31 matches (losing two to the weather) plus three internal fixtures and a tournament. It was a huge effort from everyone involved.

We were slow out of the blocks starting with a narrow defeat to Oxshott. This was followed by a victory against Spencer (Frendo 30, Patel 23no and McMurray 3 for 4) and a cracking game vs Chobham (Sohail & Rawlinson 30no), a comfortable Esher win. Wins at Guildford (Luxman 41, Frewer 30no), Horsley and Send, with Alex Kay taking 3 wickets in 4 balls, and a return Tied match at Oxshott. At Thames Ditton, Price and Rai dominated with bat and ball and Esher closing out a tight match winning by 7 runs. Along came Banstead, Chessington, Sutton and Malden, returning four victories out of four for Esher. AJ and Wimbledon descended on Esher to play a double header. The results were contrasting, a solid Esher win vs Wimbledon and a spanking by AJ brought everyone back down to earth with a bump. Five fixtures in five days, beating Spencer twice, Sutton and Wimbledon, losing a closely fought game away to Dorking. Comfortable victories against Walton, Parkins-Godwin 33, Webb 31, Jamali 3-1 off 3 and Teddington, Webb, Pitts and Frewer all retired, Porter 4-4 off 3 culminated in a season finale against an old foe in Spencer. Spencer batted first and only managed 63 from their 20 overs, excellent bowling from Le Vesconte, Jamali and Ali. Esher knocked them off in 11 overs with Rawlinson and Page putting on a powerful hitting display. We also played eight fixtures against U13 opposition, which was a stern test for our boys but one that they most certainly rose to. Comfortable wins came against East Molesey (Rawlinson 42no) and Old Ruts (Frewer 49) but the highlight was the game on the main square vs Spencer. Spencer came out all guns blazing with the opener hitting a powerful 30 retired off 14 balls. A Spencer player was overheard saying he felt sorry for these ‘little’ boys. Esher responded with some terrific bowling from Jamali, Frewer and Ali, restricting them to 127 off 20 overs. Esher got off to a strong start from Porter and Luxman, with

Frewer retiring in double quick time. Esher needed 18 off the final two overs which proved no problem for Sohail and Rawlinson, winning with two balls to spare, those pesky little boys indeed... Tight games vs Sutton, Weybridge, Horsely and Send and Wimbledon all ended in defeat, but the boys certainly learnt the importance of taking their chances (catches!). Overall, it was a hugely positive experience for all the boys, with every player stepping up, reiterated by a number of coaches but summed up nicely by the Wimbledon coach who said, “what a great bunch of boys, looks like they have a great team spirit supported by plenty of talent that will take them far”.

The season wasn't quite finished, the small matter of taking on Esher U13s. With schools back it was tricky to fit the fixture in on a Wednesday. The U13s batted first and posted a respectable 115/5 off their 20 overs, Zain Ali 4 overs, 2-9. The U12s could smell blood... 49-2 after 10 overs, on target, with a swashbuckling 30no from Frewer a highlight of the season. Despite Webb and Sohail's best efforts, the team fell just three runs short, a fitting end to a tremendous season for everyone involved.

The U11 year is always a little challenging too, as we move all the age group to "proper cricket" for the first time. Away from the 'pairs cricket comfort' of the inability to fully lose your wicket and always both batting and bowling. The preparations started with winter nets. 37 U11s attended nets, honing their technique. It was always going to bode well for the season ahead. Then Covid struck. We had a break, a lot of online shadow batting practice courtesy of Duncan's YouTube videos. Then a glimmer of hope as we launched into small group training. In the absence of any match play, we started with gusto – biweekly 2hr small group sessions in order to get the cricket on, as much as we could. We had to space out more on the ground with small groups, so the fielding improved, and the boys had more attention and batting time. Better techniques were being developed.

Then Boris allowed us to play matches. We started off with some internal games and for some it was their first game of proper cricket. Surrey had wiped the slate clean, we had no organised fixtures, all leagues cancelled, friendlies only... but no fixture schedule to go from and many opposition clubs did not have grounds either. We started on the front foot and organised games with opposition in a self-generated, Esher led, cross Surrey "post-covid friendly playcricket league". The structure meant we could get the games on for all (and most of our opposition clubs too). We ended up playing 48 matches overall across the whole age group, including the early internal ones and a couple of tournaments (victorious at Esher and Ashtead). So a lot of cricket, for all.

Favourite games are those which go close to the wire. A nail biter against Ashtead, which we really shouldn't have lost. A superb boundary catch off a ball travelling for 6 by Priyesh, led us to beat Wimbledon. All the small group fielding training did pay off. Another close encounter with Ashtead led us to victory in the inaugural Ashtead tournament. In our own Esher tournaments, there were a couple of rather tense Esher v Esher games,

Thank you to all parents, especially the scorers, match managers and umpires. So many of you stepped up this year and the age group has that fabulous cohesive feel to it. Plus, the taxi drivers, kit washers etc.

End of Season Awards – Due to Covid, we couldn't hold our prize giving ceremony this year. In hindsight, a year of Covid, without league matches being played and small group coaching meant everyone developed. It is a more difficult job to choose 'most improved'. There are maybe one or two players who stood out a little more (they know who they are); but in reality everyone contributed and also improved with a smile. We will carry forward everyone's efforts into 2021.

Under 10 (Alexander Rawlinson)

We can't play, surely we can play, we might be able to train, we can't train, we can train, we can play. There was one snag, all the league employees were furloughed so it was every club for themselves. Duncan and Alisa created the Esher Covid leagues, and we were off. We had 31 young cricketers signed up and we arranged 29 matches (losing three to the weather) with three internal fixtures.

We started with two tough fixtures; against Horsley and Send on the Saturday and Esher sending two teams to Valley End on the Sunday. Saturday was an early contender for game of the season with both teams going toe to toe with bat and ball, Esher too powerful with the bat, four players retiring and then backing it up with some terrific bowling and fielding, epitomised by a Frendo one handed snaffle in the covers to seal a comfortable victory. In our first Sunday game, revenge was on the cards as Valley End had snatched the league away from us on the final day of last season. Buoyed from Saturday's terrific performance, Esher made light work of a quality outfit and ran away easy winners. Game 2 ended with a narrow defeat, although this was the first game of the season for many of the Esher players, along with the introduction of several new members to the club. Games came thick and fast with fixtures against AJ, Weybridge and Wimbledon in the space of five days. The AJ game was a barnstormer, not least because the YC's were still flying high from their electric start to the season. Esher batted first and faced some superb bowling. With variable availability, we were able to call on two talented U9 YC's who did not disappoint. A highlight of the season for me was Harry Harding steaming in off 25 paces for his first ball in hard ball cricket, totally unfazed he skittles the batsmen. Wimbledon were too strong for Esher on the day, with notable performances from Josh Taylor Marsh and William Clarke. East Molesey were looking for revenge from the previous year. We played on a Friday night in August, sun blazing, BBQ fired up and East Molesey wonderful hospitality on show. Kunsh celebrating his birthday as skipper, elected to bat first and raced to 30 retired, receiving plaudits from all corners of the ground. The batting did not stop there with Hulme, Heslop and Giles all getting in on the act, posting an imposing total. We did our best to let East Molesey into the game with some uncharacteristic sloppy fielding but in the end were comfortable victors. All that was left to do was to cycle home after a couple of shandies. Next up was Banstead who posted 130 off their 20 overs. Esher were behind the rate the whole way, losing wickets at crucial times but once again were able to call on Frendo to steady the ship and then some immaculately clean hitting from Hulme turned the match on its head. From well behind the rate to racing ahead, Esher cruised to an unlikely victory with 10 balls to spare. Malden Wanderers batting proved too strong for Esher, despite good bowling displays from Ryan and Marley. Another batch of fixtures included an amazing game with Thames Ditton, involving 31 wickets, with a hat-trick for Armaan; Esher losing out on the final ball by just one run. The game was enjoyed so much by the boys and parents that a return fixture was arranged for the end of the season.

An Esher U10 first came next, a double header, two games in one day, an afternoon match vs Wimbledon and a return fixture with Horsley and Send, who had selected their best possible team. Unfortunately, the Wimbledon match was called off

due to the weather with Esher firmly ahead. A quick turnaround and then Horsley and Send. Expecting a repeat of the first game of the season, Esher were just too good on the day and won with a professional display of cricket all round, particularly the bowling – fast, accurate and consistent. Esher won the toss and on a tricky wicket, bowled extremely tightly and used some excellent fielding positions to restrict Spencer to only 100 off their 20 overs. James Knott, with the only century (103* v. Banstead), topped the batting averages with 430 runs @ 47.8. Richard Johnson, batting higher in the order, assumed more responsibility this year (383 @ 31.9) and Derek Lane (518 @ 34.5) produced his expected all round performance. Others teased with important cameos but failed to push on for assertive big innings. Derek Lane, Adnan Saleem and Richard Johnson represented the Surrey Championship Premier XI v. Middlesex in the final of CCC Inter League Competition. Aidan Baker and James Harvey played in earlier rounds.

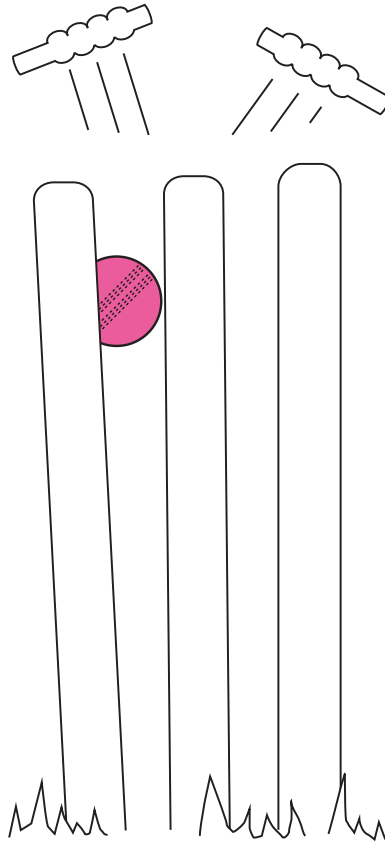
