President's Report



There's always something happening in the world of cricket – some special and some not quite so good – but never dull. This year's highlight, for me, has been the extraordinary transformation in the performance level of the England men's Test cricket team. For all of us who love our great sport, it has been fascinating to witness the change in approach, attitude and associated improvement in results, with practically the same on-field personnel that had been involved in such underwhelming performances under the previous regime.

How refreshing it is to see such a positive mindset running down through the dynamic leadership team of Brendan McCullum and Ben Stokes to the rest of the squad, instilling confidence in players who may have been, quite rightly in some cases. worrying about their future selection. Loyalty can work and has, in many cases, been repaid in much improved individual performances and a seemingly unbreakable team spirit and unity which, in turn, has seen the return of happy players and cricket fans alike. Like many who have been lucky enough to witness this amazing transformation, I found myself cynically thinking that this run of wins could not last, given the hugely positive (sometimes verging on reckless) approach to winning Test Matches. Well, they keep winning and let's hope that the same methods can continue to work for us against Australia next summer – the ultimate test

Through all of this, strong leadership, clear messaging and the total 'buy-in' from all of those involved, both on the field and off, have been the stand-out reasons for this change in fortunes.

The values of belief in people's ability to perform under pressure, backing them to come good and accepting, along the way, that failure can be a vital part of eventual success through learning is such a valuable lesson in life, let alone sport. For my part, I have particularly enjoyed the roles that both Jimmy Anderson and Stuart Broad have played in the team's success. Class is, as the saving goes. permanent and whilst both of these England legends will, inevitably, reach their career ends at some stage, their recent performances and the wealth of experience that they bring to the squad make a mockery of the utterly preposterous decision to leave them out of the West Indies tour last winter. For all young 'quickies' out there, you won't go far wrong watching Anderson and Broad in action.

Geoff's report, as always, has summarised another fantastic year for our Club at all levels and has highlighted, importantly, areas that require more focus in the future. It is sad to see Geoff stand down as Chairman but, after so many years of unstinting support as Treasurer and Chairman, it is entirely understandable that he might want to focus on other things. Referring to my earlier comments, Geoff has always brought a positive, solutions-based approach to the difficult and, sometimes, sensitive role that he has so successfully undertaken. I would personally like to thank Geoff for all of his tremendous work on behalf of the Club over the years - it is thriving and healthy and he should take pride in a 'job' extremely well done.

As Geoff mentioned in his report, it is impossible to run a Club like ours without the help of so many wonderful volunteers and, without mentioning you all by name again, I'd like to pass on my thanks to everyone who has helped out, in any way. I am sure that the new Chair, whoever it may be, will benefit from the same levels of support in the future.

Finally, I hope that all Esher CC members and their families winter well. The summer will be here before you know it and it'll be time to dust off the kit or look forward to supporting friends and loved ones. Thanks to all for your continued support.

Farewell to the ex-President, welcome back to the new



Andrew Bernard President Elect

After a spell with Surrey CCC from 1988-1992 Jonathan Robinson (Robbo) returned 'home' to help Esher win the Surrey Championship in 1993, then followed in his father Peter's footsteps by captaining the Esher 1st XI; Robbo led from the front to complete a dominant win in the Surrey Championship in 1996, scoring 744 runs, taking 17 wickets and some fine catches.

After his playing days, he took on the role of Club President in 2008, at quite a turbulent time for the club following the sad death of the previous President Graeme Newman: not to mention recent. relegation from the top division of Surrey cricket. Jon brought a great understanding and love of the game from club cricket to international cricket forged from his time as a professional cricketer followed by a career working for the MCC at Lords. Both his job and his three daughters kept him occupied in the summer, but throughout his Presidency he remained a passionate supporter of Esher; just this summer he couldn't have been more pleased watching Esher 1st XI chase down 268 to beat Wimbledon – a team for so long our major rivals in the late 1980s and 1990s. It was noticeable that as he aged, his annual President's XI fixtures followed the modern trend of shortening the game – starting as all day fixtures in Cricket Week, down through 40 over games with a long lunch, before finally settling on a 20-over game with long drinks intervals at the ten over mark and lunch between innings! Robbo has always been fully aware of the importance of Esher cricket club to both the sporting contests and to great friendships.

His Presidency term of fourteen years has seen the club recover from a low ebb to being a busy, thriving club – back near the top of Surrey cricket again. There have been many more key driving forces behind this recovery – as Jon would be the first to acknowledge – but he has throughout provided a very calming hand on the tiller. Thanks Robbo, for all you have done for Esher CC, both on and off the field, for so many years.

Life's optimists say that a loss is just the bringer of another opportunity, and indeed it is very good news to welcome Andrew Bernard as the new President, Like Jon, Andrew was a local boy. educated at Milbourne Lodge school and was the stalwart of Esher batting for two decades. His 11,159 runs in the Surrey Championship put him in the top five run scorers in the history of the championship; and when he passed 10,000 runs he was both the only player to score all 10,000 runs for the same club – but also to score them all in the top division. See page 73 for a snapshot from 1982. He has also scored more centuries (seven) in the Cricketer Cup than any other player and his 2,167 runs in that competition were well earned as he used to joke that his school only normally played in one round a year. He captained Esher CC from 1985-88, was the leading run scorer in the Championship winning side of '93 (859 runs @ 57), and second highest scorer in '96 (586 @ 35). He was recognised with induction into the Club Cricket Conference Hall of Fame in 1999. Andrew enjoyed a very successful career in business. whilst continuing to support Esher as Chairman of the Management Committee from 2003 to 2007. Whether as an Esher cricket tourist to Barbados in the 80s, or visits to the Seaford Golf tour stretching back to 1979 and still going, Andrew has remained a loval supporter of the club.

Like his friend and predecessor as President, Andrew will bring a lifelong love of the club, a great knowledge of the game and a deep pool of experience to the role.

Welcome back Bernie.

It is fair to say that Geoff has put his life and soul into Esher Cricket and has made a huge and lasting impact on the Club.

Geoff has instigated the highly successful City Lunch, has been a highly celebrated auctioneer at the Ball to save a few bob but also to raise many thousands of bob, and has secured a second ground that is the envy of our peers.

Geoff has presided over tremendous growth at the club, including record numbers in the boys section and encouraging the introduction and growth of the girls section. In addition, the senior sides have gone from strength to strength. Not so long ago the First Team were in Division 2 and we ran only three sides. Today the First and Seconds are two of the top sides in Surrey and the club are putting out five league sides and seven sides on occasion, a tremendous achievement.

Geoff has further encouraged volunteers to help at the club and fretted over making the ground and facilities as good as they can be, even including lopping off errant tree branches at New Road. He has implemented and lived the Esher values: Player development (though it has to be said that he is yet to grace the 5th XI), inclusivity, respect, enjoyment, integrity and humility.

Geoff has done all of this with a certain "bonhomie". Always a smile and a friendly word be it with players, parents, opposition, or supporters together with a diet coke or glass of something stronger.

Geoff is a club legend who has guided this club for the last 14 years as both Treasurer and as a fantastic Chairman and is a deserving winner of the Sam Ryder award.

Esher CC Chairman's Report Year to 30th September 2022



Given that I have decided to step down after nine years as Chairman and five years as Treasurer it is important to begin with sincere thanks to the legions of volunteers who make Esher Cricket Club a special club. Thank you.

I would also like to thank Neil McCallum for taking the reins in the interim and to hope that my successor is as fortunate as I have been with the volunteers around the Committee table and throughout the club.

2022 has been a good year in many ways, terrific participation from boys and girls at New Road and Imber Court, five adult league XIs for the first time and despite the lure of holidays missed in Covid summers, six and occasionally seven teams during the summer, solid performances, the first XI finishing fourth in the Championship, the 4th XI promoted, the U19s winning the Surrey T20 for the third time in as many years, many happy young cricketers enjoying competing in hundreds of league and cup matches, many age groups picking up Surrey trophies and the Under 15 girls progressing to two regional semi-finals.

We have improved facilities, at long last securing a firm foundation for the patio and extending it towards the sunniest corner, a particular boon on Ladies' Day.

We enjoyed the company of sponsors old and new, particularly the competition between Curchods, Sporting Wine Club and NFU Mutual in the Sponsors six a side. These companies and others contributed significantly to the most enjoyable and financially successful City Lunch to date, our fifth, as Geoff Miller regaled more than 180 of us with stories and ace auctioneer Jonny Gould picked our pockets. Please put 21st April 2023 in your diaries now. The annual ball was enjoyed by all who attended.

It would, however, be disingenuous to pretend that everything has gone well. Years of experience tells me that it never does. But that is life. The ladies section struggled this time but will flower next year, scheduling of practice nights and venues could have been better for the junior girls and we did not quite achieve our goal of starting work on the new nets before the season began, again that should not be far away.

None of this should detract from a good year and I would like to finish where I began with more thanks. I make no apology for making special mention of these people, but I do apologise if I have missed anybody out. In truth everyone helps make Esher what it is, from players to Age group managers, to parents, to volunteers, supporters and those involved in club management. So here goes:

Finance

It is always sensible to ask how well or badly the club has managed financially. It is hard enough keeping our heads above water at the best of times and this year was no different.

Careful management in previous years meant that we started with some cash in the bank, thereafter it was generally positive.

- Membership numbers were good, the Easter courses were well subscribed, and the nursery continues to contribute.
- We are very grateful to our sponsors. Special thanks to Rowan Preparatory School, Sporting Wine Club, NFU Mutual, and of course Andrew Dewar and his team at Curchods. We look forward to continuing to develop partnerships with Kingston Grammar School, Milbourne Lodge, Shrewsbury House, Parkside and Box Hill School next year.
- The city lunch was a roaring success and the ball went well. I would also like to thank all those who have volunteered, donated, organised and supported the club in whatever way.

Facilities

Our desire to improve facilities is strong. The New Road ground needs to be protected and improved in order that we can optimise use. This year we replaced the concrete foundations and surface of the patio at New Road and next year we plan to build new nets at New Road and then potentially at Imber Court as soon as funds allow

Chairman's Highlights

It gives me great joy to watch cricketers of all ages having fun. There was plenty of that this summer.

My first highlight was the U11 Surrey cup final against Horsley & Send at Valley End. It would have been easy for Esher heads to drop at 0-3 and 7-4 but the boys showed immense heart to post 84. Of course, it is a 'funny old game' and soon after H&S were reduced to a strikingly similar 6-4 in 7 overs, eventually struggling to 42.

The second was the U15 girls regional eight-a-side semi-final against Spencer at New Road. Chasing 140, Esher were reduced to 60-6, and with only one wicket remaining managed to make 120. A terrific last wicket stand. I was impressed that all nine Esher bowlers bowled, yes there is a roving ninth and the keeper can bowl!

The third has to be the first XIs batting against Weybridge. 300 is a super score in 50 overs so 375-6 was almost off the charts. A fine century from Justin Broad and mouth watering batting from Krish Patel, Nic Smit and David Brent. This 220 run victory must have been one of the biggest turn arounds after making only 63 in an eight wicket defeat earlier in the season!

And fourth, in particular order, watching 14 year old Alex French take his first Surrey Championship Premier League wicket. Later Alex and Alex Chambers were selected for the Bunbury festival, a splendid achievement.

Finally, I would like to wish Captains Edwards, Taylor, Dickenson, Burton, Narinesingh and others and all our cricketers good luck for the 2023 season.

- To develop and grow our Girls section.
- To provide increasing opportunities for Young Cricketers (girls and boys) to play in adult cricket.

- To work with Imber Court to improve the facility over time.
- To uphold Esher CC values at all times.
- To remain fully compliant with Clubmark requirements at all times.
- To provide support for members/potential members who struggle to fund cricket activities.
- To encourage increasing volunteer involvement in the club.

Of course, we also moved ahead with the proposal to add three nets to the New Road site, and once again can I say that the club is very grateful for the donations that have been made. Details of the nets project are covered elsewhere in the report but my thanks to John Woollhead for leading this project and to the project team, Alisa French, Sid Simmons, John Bache and Rachel Narinesingh who have worked tirelessly and skilfully to successfully complete the project.

Whilst I have not seen as many matches as our previous Chairman, I do not recall as many hundreds being scored for Esher as in 2022. There was some fantastic batting on display. There have been a few comments (rightly so!) relating to my strap line--"Putting the fun into Cricket"—but I believe that we should all look to enjoy our cricket over the summer, be it playing, watching, supporting, administering, winning or losing. Grounds and Facilities Update

Enhancement of net facility

The focus in 2022 was planning for the addition of three new, state of the art, nets adjacent to the existing nets in the far corner of the ground.

Planning permission was received in February 2022 which enabled the team to progress thinking and look at the funding required to complete the project.

A massive thank you to all who donated via the crowdfunding campaign in November and December 2022 from which a total of £36,000 was raised. This enabled us to secure grants from Sport England and the ECB both to the value of £10,000. These monies coupled with available funds from the Club enabled us to place the installation contract in December 2022 with an expected start date of early February 2023 and completion prior to the Easter school holidays.

In order to place the contract we secured a borrowing facility which we will be aiming not to draw down so expect further fund-raising activities during the summer. In addition we have opened a Just Giving page to enable those who wish to donate, but didn't get the opportunity to do so via crowdfunding, the chance to do so.


By the time you are reading this the new nets will be nearing completion and ready for use and the existing nets will have been refurbished.

Other projects on the horizon

Finance allowing, we have a number of other projects on the horizon including:

- The installation of hybrid wickets on the main and YC squares at New Road which will enhance the playing surface and result in less matches lost to rain.
- Extension of the sprinkler system on the Imber Court square again to provide an enhanced playing surface; and
- A general smartening up of the Clubhouse at New Road including new furniture and carpet.

We are hopeful that some of the above will be eligible for the various grants that are available, and we will carefully consider over the coming year what we can and cant afford.

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
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Treasurer Report 2022



During my second year as treasurer, I have aimed to bring matters relating to the financial sustainability and automation of Esher Cricket Club to the fore, and I would like to thank all of the board for their attentiveness during the meetings & willingness to make changes. The objective was to embrace the efficiencies available due to technological improvements in how we interact with the members and process both financial and non-financial data. To this effect, we introduced Xero Accounting Software and Spond as effective management and communication tools.

Profit

I am pleased to report that the Club continues to be financially healthy. We finished the 2021-2022 fiscal year (which ended on September 30, 2022) with an operating profit of 17,481 (2021 £18,129). which was attributable to continued strong membership (both retention and recruitment) (£128,340), various successful fundraising events (£50.322), a successful claim against Business Interruption Insurance for the COVID period (£25,765) and keeping operating expenses (£281.988) broadly on budget, the latter being a tribute to the efforts of all those who are involved with running the club on a day-to-day basis. We closed the year with a positive cash balance even after investing in significant capital projects (£69.153). We will continue to work hard to achieve a similar result in the coming years.

Cash flow

During the year, we spent £68,311 (2021 +£77,092) of operating cash. As mentioned above, most of it was spent on upgrading the patio area, improving the facilities at Imber Court and extensive repairs to the sightscreens at New Road and Imber Court.

Infrastructure and investment

We have agreed to invest the 2022 surplus in three new all weather nets at the New Road ground. Additional fundraising has been undertaken during winter 22/23 and the build commenced in February 2023 with the facility being ready for use by Easter 2023.

Process Improvement

We will continue to review and improve how we manage the accounting process, especially around making payments to our coaches and third-party suppliers. We have also produced a comprehensive budget for 2022-23. With the significant cash outflow required to deliver the new nets project, it is more important than ever to have a system in place that will help the management team make the required management decisions during the year.

Finally, I would like to thank David Tilston, who retired as an external independent examiner at the end of last year, for his unstinting work for over the last 13 years, and I would like to thank and welcome Aileen Woollhead, who has accepted our request to replace David to act as the Independent Examiner.

Following a fourth place finish in 2021, Esher's highest for a number of years, the 1st X1 were hoping to improve on this position in 2022 and believed there may be an outside chance of challenging for the league title. As expected, with the return of a number of overseas players returning, the league was notably stronger this year than the previous two years. Esher themselves welcomed overseas Nic Smit, in addition to Ollie Sheen and Rob Honeybul.

When looking back on the season, it is clear it can be split into two sections. The first of which was the first six games of the season. At the end of which, the team had made a slow start winning only two of the first six games. Although this was disappointing, there were times when the team played some excellent cricket. In particular, game 4 with a win at home against eventual champions Wimbledon, where set 250 to win. Esher chased the target down with 10 overs to spare with centuries for both Justin Broad and Nic Smit, Nic's second of the season already. It was said by many on the day that it was the best batting they had seen at club level.



Game 7 started the final 12 games and the second section of the season. Electing to bat, things were not looking good away at Malden Wanderers when Esher were bowled out for 155. However, excellent spells from Justin Broad (4for) and Freddie Harrison (5for) ensured Malden were bowled out 30 runs short, giving Esher a much needed win.

This kick started a run of four consecutive wins, including East Molesey and Reigate Priory. These wins preceded a loss away to Normandy, which, barring an excellent century from Nic Smit was a disappointing display.

Entering the final seven games of the year, Esher sat middle table but with no team running away with the league an outside shot at a title challenge was still on the cards. Two frustrating games followed however and despite two dominant performances, Esher could only come away with winning draws against Sunbury and Wimbledon. The Wimbledon game particularly frustrating, Esher being 20 runs short at the end despite having 10 overs less to bat than their hosts.

The next two games produced another couple of dominant wins for Esher against Weybridge and Ashstead. Justin Broad scoring a century in each game, meaning he had scored three centuries in four games. With a further win to follow against Malden Wanderers, Esher sat fourth with two games to go and still with an outside shot of winning the league. These hopes were unfortunately put to bed in the penultimate game of the season away at Sutton, where their two professionals chose the wrong game to come to the party from an Esher point of view.

A fourth place finish and a brief title challenge was no mean feat in a very strong league with some sensational individual performances included. In addition, there was a run to the final of the T20 competition, where Esher were unfortunately beaten by Wimbledon. However, being at finals day was a great experience and one that needs to become the norm for the club rather than the exception. Overall, it was a very encouraging

This year was always going to be one of rebuilding and integrating some very talented U15s and U16s into the team: the fact that we won it again to complete a treble of victories was exceptional. Freddie Harrison captained the team intelligently and integrated all the younger players perfectly. Anosh Malik scored crucial runs in the group game against Guildford and in the semi-final against Wimbledon, where he scored a match winning 50 not out against a good attack – in that game we defended a modest 128 thanks to excellent bowling from Trish Patel. Max Wallis. Freddie and an inspired spell by Mackenzie Holliday guided us into the final

Special mention to Dilan G (U13) for his great effort at the end, hitting 19 off 13 balls with some clean striking and a late rally from Alfie W, 19 off 15, was all too little too late.

Back to winning ways vs Normandy winning comfortably by 68 runs, posting 136-8, Jaanzabe Jamali 54 from 56 with nine fours the highlight. We bowled Normandy out for 68 with Alfie Webb, Tom Price and Charlie Pitts all taking two wickets. A feisty affair with Walton at Imber Court much to big Al's delight, Walton struggled to 116-8 from 25 overs, Tom Price expensive with 3-44 and a cheeky over from Barney R (U12) who had only just got out of bed! Richie Page 41 from 39 and Charlie Pitts 28 from 23 hit 10 fours and steered us home in quick time winning by five wickets with eight overs to spare!

Guildford proved too strong for us on the day, posting 153-6 from a light affected 23 overs. Tom Price and Felix Porter both with two wickets each. Esher never got going and were behind the rate from the off limping to 101-9, losing to the league winners is no disgrace in the year up...

It was nice to end the season on a high, playing our one and only league game at New Road, Old Whits didn't provide much opposition to be honest, however that didn't stop Ram Kolanu who plundered 14 fours in a brilliant 89 from 73 balls, taking us to 158-6 in our 25 overs. Old Whits were bowled out for 65 in 18 overs, Priyesh Patel and Ayan Sohail both sharing two wickets a piece this time

The season was punctured with mixed availability however this allowed over 23 boys to play in an U15 league, providing great opportunities to stretch their skills against some tough opposition.

U14 Cup Run

We started with a bye and a concession from Ripley followed by a home tie vs Ashtead, who had us reeling at 55-5 in the U13 first round the year before! Esher were put in to bat at New Road and managed to score 132-5 from our 20 overs.

No one really got going but solid contributions from Richie P, 37, Alex Frewer, 32 and Max Rawlinson, 22 gave us something to defend. Ashtead never threatened that total with some tight bowling up front from Jamali and Ayan Sohail, Ayan the pick of the bowlers with 2-8. Even Alex Frewer got to turn his arm over!

Epsom were our next victims. Esher once again posted a sub-par score of 134 all out from 19.4 overs on a tricky pitch, Noah Luxman looked stylish for his 40* off 33 and Josh K (U13) showed the U14s how to bat with a rapid 30 from 14 balls including five marvellous fours! The game was played in wonderful spirit epitomised by a dog stopping play for five minutes and then the same dog trying to disrupt play again, only for Tommy Price to float one up for the batter to reverse sweep in the direction of the dog to distract it! Esher were always too powerful with some miserly bowling from Porter and Sohail, the former returning season best figures of 3-8 from four overs including two maidens.

Next up were Stoke D'Abernon, the first game I haven't attended in the cup for three years, I left it in Mark P's safe hands... Esher put Stoke in who scored 122-6 from their 20 overs, surely not enough with our powerful and deep batting line up. Aayan Sohail (U13) with the best figures, 2-8 from his three overs. At 46-2 it was looking OK, at 74-5 we hoped we had enough in the locker. At 101-7 and 103-8 things had started to unravel. We needed 20 from the last two overs with only one wicket in hand. Jamali hit the first ball of the 19th over for six, 14 off 11, the pendulum was swinging. Nine off the last, 1, 2, dot. Six needed from three balls, Aayan Sohail is dropped on the boundary and the ball trickles to the rope, it's a four. Two needed

from two, a scampered single and the scores are tied, the last ball is a bye, and Esher perform their greatest escape yet. Mark P said it was never in doubt...

Big crowds, supporters and players from other clubs came to watch this game vs Banstead in the semi-final at New Road. Banstead won the toss and chose to bat posting 118-5, excellent tight bowling by Felix Le Vesconte and J Jamali up front. 118 was never going to be enough and when their premier bowler was dispatched over the nets for six by Charlie Pitts, Esher never looked back. Richie Page and Max Rawlinson steered us home with four overs to spare, a very strong display indeed!

The final was held at Valley End with the biggest boundary I had ever seen. Esher were put in to bat by Valley End and were off to a slow start, Charlie Pitts the only one to have a strike rate above a hundred in his 22 from 19 balls. Regular wickets were falling with little support for Max Rawlinson, 41* managing to scrape to 118 all out. It was a big pitch but if they got off to a flyer our six year unbeaten record in the cup was in jeopardy. In the end, hostile bowling up front from Felix Le Vesconte and J Jamali, followed by season best figures from Tom Price, 4 overs 4-13 and Ayan Sohail 1.4 overs 3-6 meant that Esher ran out comfortable winners by 48 runs in the end.

Another successful year for our U14 2nd XI was sandwiched by two matches: both away at Valley End; both played on Bank Holidays; both separated by the entire four months of Summer; and both with somewhat different outcomes. 2022 proceedings began with a Tier 1 match on a blustery Monday afternoon, with Esher winning the toss, electing to field and soon regretting it. Valley End posted 195-6 from 30 overs with Esher's bowlers suffering at the hands of their middle order. We responded with a solid 39 from opener Ed Reilly and a run a ball 57 from Max Webb but fell 58 runs short in a match that seemed to last forever.

A swap to the U14 County Cup soon followed with an away trip to Chessington, who chose to bowl on a pitch less predictable than the British weather. After an umpiring controversy and the wicket being 'reset' to 21 yards, Esher were reduced to 21-5. Charlie Lappin made an assured 26, whilst getting frequently hit from length balls rearing up around his head. Esher scrambled to 90, but despite 3 for 16 a-piece from Ed and Owen Flower, Chessington won by four wickets with four balls left, including a batter (erroneously and hilariously) doing a lap of honour when miscalculating the winning runs. Next was Guildford and a grandstand finish. Excellent, batting from captain Alex Kay (27), Sunny Sharma (21), Freddy Lister (18) and a 50* from U13 player. Jayden Flower, saw Esher post an imposing 168 off its 25 overs. A couple of wickets from fast bowler. Ollie Fenton (3-24), helped reduce Guildford to 25-3 and Esher were cruising. However, Guildford had other ideas, reaching 155-6 with two overs left. Ben Stuart-Reckling's (2-16) excellent penultimate over meant a final showdown and more umpiring controversy with the call of a fielding circle no-ball tying scores with one ball

left. Charlie held his nerve taking a wicket off the final delivery to secure a tie in a match that could have gone any which way.

A Friday night away at Banstead will be remembered for the delayed start (late finishing tournament); weather (drizzle never stopped); and result (Esher snatching defeat from the jaws of victory). Solid bowling from Alex (2-14) and Sunny (2-10) meant Esher was only chasing 113 from 20 overs. A sound start, followed by Aarvan Desai's pyrotechnics (34 from 26), preceded an Englandesque collapse with the last eight wickets disappearing for 35 runs and a 16 run defeat. Hopefully something better was around the corner... A change is as good as a rest, and so proved the adage with Esher playing its first ever '100' match at New Road against Hampton Wick Royal. The format of a maximum 20 deliveries (for both bowlers and batters) seemed to agree with Esher, who controlled the tempo and held our visitors to 92-4 from its 100 balls. Ed (23*) and Alex (38) then put on a rapid fire 69 first wicket partnership helping to see Esher home in only 56 balls.

A comfortable Tier 1 win on Father's Day followed at Imber Court against a decent Crown Taverners outfit after a few wobbles, with Charlie (21) propping up the middle order after decent early work from U13 Privesh Patel (19), followed by an accomplished all-round fielding display delivering a 29 run win. A tough defeat away at Ewell, followed by excellent 27 run and 5 wicket wins at home to Ashtead and Stoke D'Abernon underlined Esher's inconsistency in the league. So back to the '100' we went... An away match at Thames Ditton on a hot summer's evening followed with the hosts putting Esher in, and soon wishing they hadn't. Alex (25) and Ed (20*) once again proved their appetite for this format of only facing 20 balls. Able support from Max (16*) and Owen (10*) set a target of 104. Charlie set the tone with an early LBW, via an appeal that could be heard miles away and Harresh Jayanathan (2-5) worsened TD's misery. Alex rotated the bowling expertly to strangle their batting and deliver a 15 run win.

Back to the league and a horror show at home to Ewell. This was easily Esher's worst performance of the year, resulting in a 10 wicket loss after only scoring 82-6 in 20 overs. Nobody was truly spared from some very encouraging words from the manager! If anyone thought that maybe this was a vear to focus on the 100 competition, then they did not have long to wait. Walton-on-Thames was up next in the quarter finals. Winning the toss and batting seemed like the ideal plan for a match starting in the evening on a wicket so dry it better resembled Mumbai. With an outfield like glass providing excellent value for your shots. Ed once again showed his pomp in this competition. This time he blazed 42* from 20 balls including two sixes. Support from Aaryan (17*), Priyesh (23*) and fellow U13 Shiv Patel (16*) took Esher to 127-3. More controlled bowling by Shiv (2-2), the standout, left Walton stranded on 93-4 and another comfortable Esher win. With leagues completed, it was now all about the 100, albeit with a month's gap before a very tasty semi-final clash at home to Cranleigh in late August. Scoring runs for fun in The Hundred and always electing to bat, Cranleigh shocked Esher by winning the toss and choosing to field on a night where light would disappear later on. Cranleigh's bowling was pretty good too. leaving Esher wobbling on 27-3 and 45-4 after a quick opening once again by Ed (17 off 12). Devan Patel delivered a superbly crafted 22*, marshalling the innings and setting Cranleigh 108 to win. They were off to a flyer with 54 off the first 40 balls. but with three wickets down thanks to James Allsop and Ed. runs were drying up. The game was in the balance, but with the light fading fast and Dillon Rai, Max, Aaryan and Devan grabbing wickets, Cranleigh were falling behind the run rate and when Fenton Elliott took a catch off Max to close out the 10 run win, mayhem ensued in the dressing room.

So back to Valley End, where it all began for the Hundred Plate final, only this time to face a Sutton team that also had an impressive cup run behind them. Alex won the toss and elected to bat and Esher flew out of the blocks again with Ed (37) and Alex (10) setting the platform. Boundaries were at a premium due to the 70-yard outfield, and with the run rate slowing and wickets falling to some consistent bowling, Esher somewhat stalled to 110. Sutton started brightly with 40 coming off the first 30 balls and confidence was high before excellent fast bowling from James, had a nick behind to the keeper and two balls later, superb boundary fielding from Max executed an amazing

split second run out. Wickets started to fall regularly to the bowlers and with the pressure on Sutton, two more run outs closed out the game and a 26 run win for the inaugural U14 100 Champions, Esher CC.

As ever, massive congratulations to the boys, but of course none of this was possible without the help of Tony Rai and Hayden Flower amongst many others. However, a special mention goes to Dan Webb as he was with me through it all this year, scoring, umpiring, supporting and helping – a big thank you. (Mark Lappin)

Under 13 Boys

With 45 boys in the group and a lot less rain than last year, we were able to play 51 matches this season across five leagues and three cup entries. Whilst we always want to be competitive, the main aim was to give the boys as much opportunity as possible to learn, develop and enjoy their cricket. A mid-table finish in the Tier 1 leagues, both in our own age group and the age group above, indicates that we have achieved the right balance.

Half of all the matches we played were Tier 1 and sixty percent of the boys played Tier 1 cricket this season. For Tier 2 competitions, the aim is to provide a lot of match play opportunities to promote the development of skills. Several boys played both Tier 1 and Tier 2 cricket and we successfully won two midweek Tier 2 leagues this year, indicating the strength and depth of our whole age group. For all the Cup competitions, the primary aim is to win and this is reflected in the team selection. It is also worth remembering that Cup restrictions prevent players from playing across different teams.

Cup matches tend to be tense, and we had a nervous start against East Molesey in round 2. Our fielding was excellent and not one bye was conceded. We comprehensively beat Horsley and Send in the Quarter-final with a strong bowling and fielding performance. The semi-final against Ashtead was both close and entertaining. We were restricted to 101 runs which looked to be light. At 35-4. Ashtead appeared to be on the ropes. However, they fought back hard and we managed to scrape in by five runs, due a gritty bowling performance and two outstanding direct hit run-outs. We faced Chobham in the Surrey Cup Final and managed to restrict them to 107. This was a good target to chase down and we knocked off the runs in 15 overs. Once again, Esher were Surrey Cup champions, representing Surrey in the national championships. Unfortunately, we lost a very close game to Hampstead by seven runs. We had a very good start and managed to restrict their batters in the early overs. However, they still managed to get a competitive score and we were never able to get ahead of the run rate. The boys learned a lot from the experience, which should help them in the years ahead.

In the 100 ball competition, our Tier 2 Plate teams were both knocked out of the completion in the early rounds, and we were not able to successfully defend the 2021 plate final.

In the U14 Tier 1 Sunday league, we managed to finish mid table. This is a great result given that we are playing up against some very strong teams. Whilst the older boys do not necessarily bowl better, they hit the ball much harder and tend to punish loose bowling. We were also impacted by losing many of our Surrey performance players to their Sunday matches. All in all, a very good learning experience. There were several notable batting and bowling performances which helped us to win three of our matches. In the Griffins Tier 1 Sunday league, we also finished mid table. Once again, there were some fine individual batting and bowling performances across the board. However, we probably should have had a better finish which requires us to be more consistent.

In the Tier 2 leagues, we were brilliant and won both the Central and Midweek leagues. We were fourth in the Sunday league, where we had to abandon two games. Looking at the statistics, we had nine boys retiring after scoring 30 runs and five boys took at least three wickets in a game.

Once again, our results are indicative of our depth and the tremendous skills the boys are developing.

As always, it takes a tremendous amount of effort, coordination and support to get through the season. Once again, thank you all for your support – match managers, umpires, scorers and those providing match teas. It was great to see so many parents involved, particularly with umpiring and scoring. We continue to develop a strong community identity which we will build on in the 2023 season. Congratulations to the boys who continue to be part of the Surrey Performance set up. It is very competitive process and we all benefit from their contributions to the age group. We hope the boys get some well-earned rest and we look forward to another exciting season in 2023. It's been thoroughly enjoyable looking after this Under 8 age group, especially as league matches against external opposition is introduced. To witness the sheer enjoyment of those playing cricket matches for the first time and their rapid progression over the course of the season has been a real privilege. U8 league cricket is six-a-side pairs cricket with a soft ball. This ensures more ball contact and involvement in the game by all. With 60 league games across eight six-a-side teams supplemented by internal games and playing in two tournaments, we were able to provide cricket for everyone who was available on a weekly basis. The focus is participation, enjoyment and development of all.

We started the season with internal practice games. A learning curve for both players and parent volunteers, especially those parents introduced to a pairs scoresheet for the 1st time! Those first practice games provided a fun safe learning experience. Running between the wickets provided some particular amusement. "Yes? No? What? Maybe? Shrug? What do you think? Quizzical expression? Maybe? Then, when the ball was fielded, the batting pair often decided at that point 'YES'. Sometimes they scraped home. sometimes definitely not. Sometimes they even attempted to run again due to their new found running confidence and fielding overthrows as a result of the communication chaos caused! The next coaching sessions were unsurprisingly on running between the wickets, calling and backing up in the field! Following on from those first practice games was the introduction of competitive match-play cricket for most of the squad, they performed brilliantly throughout the season. Tactically they improved as well as technically. By the end of the season general improvement in game awareness was brilliant to see. Running between the wickets, fielding skills, backing up (and minimising overthrows) were the stand-out areas of improvement. Parent scorers also started to achieve A* grades for both effort. presentation and innovation for Spond uploading and use of scoring apps. Travelling to the opposition also took us on a journey to some very beautiful grounds and villages.

Obviously, it's not about winning at this age, but the improvements in both technical skills and game awareness manifested itself in good performances across all teams. We won two of the leagues we were entered into and finished second in three of them as well. The U8 team that travelled to the Horsley & Send tournament also came home with the silverware after winning all their games.

By the end of the summer, over 30 boys were regularly training with a hard ball and six boys were selected to play for Surrey CCC in the age group above: a brilliant achievement. There are lots of very talented cricketers in this age group so it will be great to see how much further improvement all can make over the winter, before a full season of hard ball cricket next year.

Finally, a massive thanks to Duncan, Sohail and the coaching team for all their help over the season. Thanks to Lek and all the bar/kitchen staff, for keeping the boys in ice creams and fruit pastilles and everyone in bacon rolls. 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Girl's Report

U13 to U17 Girls

This year has been a tricky one for the Esher U13-U17 girls. We got off to a rather shaky start in April/ May with the switch to training in Chessington on Friday evenings causing the membership numbers to fall away, with only 37 girls returning compared to 69 in 2021. This caused some issue with the leagues, and we had to withdraw from several competitions.

Nevertheless, despite this fall off in numbers, the team has been very successful. We won 10 of our 19 games (53%) compared to only seven of 20 last year (35%) – this is excellent progress from last year.

The highlight of the year was our U15 cup run. We started on a wet Sunday morning against Ashtead and looked set for defeat after losing three early wickets in our run chase. The game was turned on its head by a remarkable 51 runs scored in a matter of minutes by U13 Toni Bednall.

Toni went on to better her performance, scoring 77 runs in the next match to beat Binfield.

The quarter final against Chobham was the first match the team had played at New Road for the whole season, and it was witnessed by a large, loud group of Esher supporters. The match was won by a magnificent performance by Emilia Pitts, taking five wickets and then scoring over 40 runs in a matter of minutes.

Sadly, the team was beaten by Spencer, the eventual cup winners. It was a close match in which Saskia took the wickets of four Surrey players, but the team suffered an early batting collapse. Ellen Clark and Anna Goodsman pushed Spencer to the very end, but the target was too big.

Nevertheless, it was a fantastic achievement and bodes well for the future. The U13s and U14s combined to play a few matches in the U14 league, but we struggled to field teams and ultimately had to concede too many matches.

Senior Girls award winners

By the time we hit July, the success of the U15 cup run had helped to form a core team of players who know and trust each other. This core group have formed the spine of the U17 teams and had we not had to cancel a few games, we could have easily won the U17 Tier 1 league – despite not playing with any 17-year-olds. We also did very well in the tournament we organised in the Summer, winning a silver and two bronze medals.

With a bit more practice during the closed season we should be able to push the likes of Spencer, Basingstoke and East Moseley much further.

In August the U15 girls played Esher's first ever Hundred match, beating Ashtead before being knocked out in the semi-finals by the eventual tournament winners Bexley. It was a close match that we could have easily won with a bit more luck.

At an individual level there has also been some real progress. Four players (Antonia, Arabella, Anna and Saskia) have scored over 50 runs in a match compared to none last year – Antonia did it twice, scoring 51 and 77 in the T20 cup run.

Seven players scored more than 100 runs in the season (the previous four plus Emilia, Ellen and Charlotte), compared to only three last year. Our batting strike rate has also increased dramatically. Last year only two players scored, on average, more than a run a ball compared to nine this year (Emilia, Phoebe, Toni, Saskia, Anna, Lucy K, Arabella, Lexie and Anaya).

The key area we need to work on is our bowling. As we play against better teams, we will automatically get hit more – last year we conceded 2103 runs compared to 2215 this year. Two players achieved five wickets in a match (Emilia and Anna), compared to none last year.

In total, however, we took fewer wickets than last year – 82 compared to 113. If we are to improve as a team, this is the area in which we need to work.

At the end of the season a final match was held and awards were given as follows:

Charlotte Reed – Club player of the year There were several candidates for this award, with Izzy or Mary both being strong contenders. Charlotte pipped them both to the award. She has played more games than anyone else (she has also been playing in the men's 5th and 6th teams). She coaches the younger players on Sunday mornings. She is hugely reliable as bowler and batter – she was the player who helped anchor several innings during the T20 cup run and her bowling is very difficult to score from. And I will never forget her fabulous catch in the cup game against Chobham.

Emilia Pitts - Best Bowler

Again, there were several candidates. Saskia for consistency and taking the most wickets during the season – especially in Spencer cup match. Lexie for showing the biggest improvement in speed and accuracy. Nicola was an even stronger contender, being the most economical of all of the bowlers over the season. But the winner is Emilia. She has almost the same economy as Nicola, but has taken more wickets, the highlight of which was her five wicket haul against Chobham in the cup match. She has also been a fantastic captain.

Antonia Bednall - Best batter

Anna, Saskia and Emilia could all claim this award, having either scored more than 50 runs or having hit the ball so hard that the opposition were petrified (Emilia) Antonia is the only one to have almost single handily got us through two rounds in the T20 cup, with a score of 77 in one game and 51 in another. I say 'almost single handily' because she couldn't have done it without Charlotte's support in both games. She is our youngest player. She also has the highest batting average of all the players.

Arabella Finnigan – All Rounder

Anna, Ellen, Emilia, Lucy and Saskia were all contenders for this award. Arabella is, however, the standout player. She has batted magnificently, especially in the second half of the season and has the third highest batting average of the year. In addition, she has established herself as our number one wicket keeper and has changed the course of many games.

Anna Goodsman – Player of the year Ellen, Saskia and Emilia could easily have taken this award. They have all batted, bowled and fielded exceptionally well. They have also all taken on the role of captain from time to time. Nevertheless, Anna deserves this award more than anyone else. She's scored the second highest number of runs and taken second highest number of wickets for the year, but most importantly she's also the most improved player of the year. Anna wasn't able to collect her award on the day, so Saskia stood in for her in the photo.

U10 to U12 girls

The 2022 season saw Esher U10-12 Girls have another successful season in the Surrey Hardball leagues, entering five teams in four competitions, which resulted in our U12s being crowned champions of the Tier 1 North and our U10-11s finishing a very respectable fourth in the Tier 1 South, following a last gasp win at New Road against a very strong Ashtead team.

This was one of the best performances of the season by any team in the section. Ashtead were confident in electing to bat first but excellent bowling from Clara Pyecroft and captain Danielle McGlashan managed to contain them to a total of 84 in 16 overs. Ashtead made the chase very challenging, taking wickets regularly and just when it looked like they might defend their total, Gemma Langham gave us hope in the middle overs before Izzy Bailey smashed 20 in the final pair to get us over the line off the final ball and get the U10-11s their first win in U10-12 Tier 1.

A special mention must be made of all U10s who played in the Tier 1 fixtures, who showed exceptional courage against opposition teams mostly comprised of experienced U12s. This was perhaps best shown by Amelie George who against the eventual Tier 1 South winners Weybridge, walked out to face some of the best U12 players in the league and very nearly bowled and batted Esher to the win.

Of equal importance, it was pleasing to see the growth in our teams playing in the Tier 2 London and Central leagues, where many girls made their hardball debuts and managed to bag two great wins over the Spencer teams in the process. The victory in the Tier 2 London league came via a thrilling chase of 118 in 16 overs, which after captain Maisie Luxman and Maya Patel had laid a solid platform, Poppy Arnold-Roberts and Flora Maclenan steered the ship home off the final ball.

The Tier 2 Central win over Spencer was set up by some excellent batting from Gemma Langham, Aashi Amin, Lucia Parkinson and captain Marnie Lane, setting an imposing total that Spencer's hopes of chasing were dashed by a fine spell at the death from Grace Coleman.

These victories ensured we did the treble over Spencer in junior girls after the U12s won an early season crunch match in the Tier 1 North at New Road. Arabella Choudhry and Hannah Price were calm personified in chasing down a total that looked very challenging after Spencer had bowled exceptionally well at the first two pairs. After beating Richmond the week before thanks to a 40 run partnership between Ashley Maclean and Mia Cunningham, which they backed up against Ashtead a week later in a game that was also memorable for two excellent catches from Sofia Wood, the foundations had been laid for a first league title.

A further four consecutive victories were delivered by some excellent performances from girls being promoted from Tier 2, which was a really pleasing sign of the breadth and depth of the talent we have in junior girls. There were unplayable deliveries from Alyssa Saunders, swashbuckling batting from Eleonore Mighall and fine all-round work from Olivia Priest, Zara Ingles and Sofia El-Bachir. These performances took the Tier 1 North league to a decider in the final game away at second placed Wimbledon.

In a game where Wimbledon raced to 50 for no wicket off the first four overs, we needed a heroic performance from our Captain Marvel, Mayako Dennis, who took two catches and bowled an outstanding 16th over to restrict Wimbledon to 112 off 16. She then ignited the chase with four consecutive fours which allowed Ashley Maclean

to apply the coup de grace, when we still needed two off the last ball. Of all the skills the girls had been encouraged to copy from the professionals during this long and successful season, just one remained – the pitch invasion at the moment of victory – which they duly did in style!

As a section, we also hosted Esher Tournaments at Imber Court in May and New Road in July, a format that is proving very popular with our girls and the opposition clubs. Esher were represented in the finals of both events, but unfortunately losing out to strong performances from a very good Ashtead team (whose management love the Bento Boxes almost as much as the cricket). Against the disappointments of losing in both finals, the Esher girls played some exceptional, setting new standards for their performances in all



three departments. The spectacle was further enhanced by outstanding contributions from U11s Aanya Jain and Clara Pyecroft along with U10s Lucia Parkinson, Marnie Lane and Holly Potter who all did the business against top ranked U12 opposition.

While initially hesitant to commit to day-long events, the feedback from those attending is that they enjoy this cricketing experience more than any other. This is partly because of the format's ability to produce quick-fire, thrilling encounters but also because it is an environment where the bonds of friendship between the girls can really flourish. Along with the thrills and spills in the league competitions, the next Esher Tournament dates in particular will be much looked forward to in the 2023 season.

Five teams could not dispute so many matches and tournaments without the assistance of a brilliant group of parent volunteers. The junior girls section is much indebted to the tireless commitment of Helen and Tim Pyecroft, Kelly and David George, Cameron Bailey, Rob Lane, Julian Jones, Clive Luxman, Vikesh Patel, Ollie Saunders and Alistair Maclenan.

Gordon Dean obituary

Gordon Dean sadly passed away peacefully on 18th November. He was a stalwart in Esher's First XI of the 60s and 70s as a wicket keeper batsman and was for many years the Club's Honorary Secretary. Gordon went to St Andrews prep school in Eastbourne where he was an exact contemporary of Esher legend James Parker and then attended Winchester College with another Esher legend. Max Seager, all of whom remained lifelong friends with the club being such an important common bond between them. Gordon went up to Cambridge University where he represented the Crusaders and played racquet sports before qualifying as a chartered accountant. He had a highly successful City career with Esher's captain and subsequent President Peter Wreford at Gresham Trust.

Living opposite the club in March House. Littleworth Avenue, Esher CC became a focal point of his social life with his first wife Lindy and three children Joanna, Caroline and James, who was a promising left arm spinner with Esher Colts and the club before he moved to New York. Sadly Gordon's father was watching his grandson play for Esher sitting in the pavilion when he passed away. As a wicket keeper Gordon, regularly attired in his MCC sweater, always had a funny word to say behind the stumps and his catchphrase was "sorry cock" if a chance went amiss or four byes slipped past. His skill allowed him to occasionally stand up to quick bowlers on a flat one including Esher's great fast bowling all rounder Colin Smith, ex-Lancashire C.C.C. and Cambridge University. When Gordon, not irregularly, managed a leg side stumping off them, which was always his intended aim, it was something to witness and applaud.

He was often seen in the early mornings exercising his two black labradors, one named Satchmo after the great singer Louis Armstrong, by jogging around the ground, before going to work, after three ever decreasing circles of the outfield leaving his footprints clear to see in the frost or dew. When reprimanded at a committee meeting for ignoring the "no dogs allowed" sign on the gate, quick witted as usual, he replied "my dogs can't read".



Gordon left Esher when his first marriage ended and had a wonderfully happy life with his second wife Sally living near Winchester, and in Florida during the winter months. Visits to Esher were seldom but he always attended the old players lunch whenever he could staving with the Parkers. He was due to come to an Esher traditional lunch last December honouring Esher's senior member Peter Wilson. Sally said that he passed away a few days after suffering a severe stroke with all his family by his side, but he had thankfully enjoyed watching Englands T20 win in Melbourne which gave him great pleasure. Gordon's larger than life persona will be much missed by all that fondly remember him and our thoughts are with Sally and his children Joanna, Caroline and James, who he leaves behind

His funeral was held at St. Cross in Winchester on 30th November 2022, with many of his friends from Esher present, along with his wife Sally, and Lindy and all his children.

SEASON 1982

The results for the season reflect the greatly improved weather over the appalling 1981 season but also represent a mildly disappointing season for the Club with both League Elevens lower in the table of the Surrey Championship. Again our grateful thanks go to Leslie Wood who, in spite of the volatile climatic conditions produced some splendid wickets during the year. This was in spite of expert opinion that we had very serious problems with the "square" in 1981 but that crisis seems to have abated, at least for the time being.

Individually the season belonged to Andrew Bernard who was, almost unbelievably prolific with the bat particularly in the early part of the season. He took a season off to devote his summer to playing cricket and was well rewarded for this decision and hopefully has derived life-time memories of his performances during the year. He broke the record for the aggregate number of runs during a season for Esher, a record held apparently since time immemorial by the President, Peter Wreford. His outstanding innings was a century against the Old Whitgiftians and of his runs, 605 were scored in the League. The Club extends their heartiest congratulations to him and thanks for doing Esher cricket so much good. The Captain, Christopher Sutton-Mattocks, ably supported Andrew in the opening position and redeemed an indifferent season with an excellent 121 not out on the final day against Banstead to give him an aggregate for the year of 567 in the League. Other notable contributors include James Parker, returning to the First Eleven to demonstrate age before beauty, and Christopher Worlidge whose obvious talent has not been fully converted into the number of contributory performances which it deserves.

Other regulars who contributed to the batting, albeit to a limited extent include Richard Brown, Tim Elliott and Robbie Johnston, whose impeccable wicket-keeping complimented the high standard of fielding during the season.

It cannot be said that the batting was augmented by Anthony Wreford who amassed thirteen runs from eight innings having played in 17 matches. One might be forgiven, however, for thinking that he may have been bowling at himself because his memorable performance in 1981 was followed during the season by an aggregate of 55 wickets in the League making him comfortably top of the averages. Support for him was not significantly forthcoming although Richard Brown and Tim Elliott both persevered gamely respectively taking 32 and 21 wickets.

The bowling has missed the former penetration both of Bobby Lowe and Anthony Howeson and Robert Munro, while continuing to be as fast as anyone in the League, has not really been able to harness his speed to real success.

It is a great credit to the Captain that availability has been excellent and no fewer than ten players appeared in 16 or more matches out of the total of 20 played during the season. It is so encouraging to see so much enthusiasm engendered although the results were disappointing.
