The club has nurtured this talent for many years, and it will be gratifying to see it come through into our top teams.

The terrible tragedy of losing Lek is foremost with many of us as we review 2025. I first played against Duncan in 1976 when he was a remarkable fifteen-year-old batting prodigy. He came to Esher as a player in 1992 and has been with us each season since then. He and Lek were fixtures at our club for so many years, and we can only pay tribute to the tireless efforts that they both put in over those years. Geoff Ellis spoke eloquently about her life at Esher at the funeral and all present paid their respects to a true servant of the club, who will be remembered so fondly. R.I.P. Lek.

I would like to pay tribute to Neil McCallum for his service as Chairman for the last three years. I am delighted that he will stay involved in the capacity of Secretary to the Club, but his enthusiasm, hard work and focus have been vital to Esher, and we should all thank him for the huge effort that he put in. Neil is followed in the role by Dan Taylor, who has been a long time Committee member, involved in many aspects of the club. He will no doubt continue to trap batsmen with his wily left arm spin, and I am sure he will combine the roles of player and Chairman very effectively. He has plenty of expertise within our club to call upon with so many of our team having such a long history with the club. Good luck, Dan!

So, in closing I do wish all our players, male and female, seniors and juniors, a wonderful season, let's hope for good weather and trophies!

Chairman's Report

This report cannot begin before we take a moment to remember Lek who sadly passed away in August. Her full obituary is elsewhere in this report, but it is right to remember that Lek was a very well-loved colleague and friend to us all and has done so much to make the club what it is today through her many years of dedicated service. Lek will be sadly missed by all of us at the club.

It was also heart-warming to see the wonderful response from members to offer support both practical and emotional and for the well-respected one-minute silence in honour of Lek before each of the senior matches on the following Saturday.

The cricket season had some great moments. It started in May with the Women's 1st XI winning the Surrey Cup for the first time in the club's history, a wonderful achievement. It ended with the U19s winning their T20 final at the Oval. Some lads have now played at Lords and the Oval in the space of two seasons; dreams do come true!

The volunteers on the Management Committee and in central roles have done a great job to keep the club moving forward. Whether it be improving the facilities, safeguarding, financial control, membership enquiries or fixtures planning, a lot of time, care and attention is given to make sure that the club is run effectively, thank you.

When I started as Chairman, I put in place some standing goals for the club to aim for. I provide an update below.

To develop and strengthen our Ladies section.	This has been another wonderful season for the Ladies with a keen group training and playing in several softball matches with growing success. Well done to Sue Da Vall.
To develop and grow our Girls section.	The older girls played for the Women's 1 st XI in the Surrey league and won the Surrey Cup Final, held over from 2024. The younger age groups are all making good progress and enjoying the Tuesday evening or Sunday morning training sessions. Sid and Matt deserve a lot of credit.
To provide increasing opportunities for Young Cricketers (girls and boys) to play in adult cricket.	This continues to be a strength of the club with many of our young cricketers contributing to the senior adult teams this year.

To develop further the practice facilities at New Road	No major developments have taken place this year, but the area behind the nets has been landscaped and a ditch installed to reduce the flood risk.
To work with Imber Court to improve the facility over time.	The pitches have generally been very good this year, hence the good totals from our 5 th XI for example. The outfield, in line with other grounds, suffered with the dry weather.
To uphold Esher CC values at all times.	Mostly achieved. There are isolated cases where members need to be reminded of the club values and which are addressed during the season.
To remain fully compliant with Clubmark requirements at all times.	Achieved
To provide support for members/potential members who struggle to fund cricket activities.	This remains a work in progress.
To encourage increasing volunteer involvement in the club.	This remains a work in progress. The club recognises and thanks the many members who volunteer as AGMs, scorers, umpires during the season. New volunteers are required to assist with the work of the Management Committee. Nothing just happens!

In terms of the structure of the Club, a small working party has worked hard to change the structure from an unincorporated association to a limited company with charitable status. This follows the approval of the new structure from the members in May 2025. I am pleased to report that the Charities Commission approved the new company in October, and we have transitioned the club to the new structure over the winter months. I believe that this is an important development for the club that places the club on a good footing for the medium term. My thanks to all those on the working group, with a special mention for David Crook and Nick Page.

2025 Season

The 2025 season was a roller coaster but enjoyable, nonetheless. The 5 wins on the last day of the season, with 3 sides being promoted and the 1st team securing their spot in the premier league, was a particularly good day.

The 1st team struggled to put consistent results together and therefore became embroiled in a relegation battle for much of the season. In the last month good wins against Wimbledon, who won the league, and Sutton on the last day of the season, meant that the 1st team survived in the premier league by 7 points. Phew!

The 2nd team played in a league with several 1st teams and did very well to finish a commendable 3rd, with ten victories. Darren Helwick, Ali Birkby and Adam Helwick topping the run charts, and Joe de la Fuente and Dan Taylor taking the most wickets.

The 3rd XI proved to be the beating heart of the club. Well led by Angus Barrett the side played a lot of positive cricket, winning 11 matches and in an exciting end to the season clinched a promotion place in a battle with 3 other clubs. Will Hamilton, Angus Barrett and Austin Wilman had good seasons

with the bat, Kunal Mishra and Chris Parrish topped the wicket-takers and Max Simpson was the top all-rounder.

The 4th XI had a successful season with 11 victories with promotion achieved on the last day. Craig Williams, Alex Mason and Zachary Perkins were the top run scorers with Shailendra Singh, Chris Harvey, Tom Burnett and Odran Williams taking the bowling honours. Congratulations to captain John Woollhead for leading his team to promotion.

The 5th XI had another strong finish to the season, bolstered by several Esher youth players.

Ben Frendo and Fraser Bache were the top run scorers and Rahul De Silva, Fraser Bache and Joe Goodson took the most wickets in a team where over 60 players donned an Esher shirt, with cameo performances leading to promotion up the sides for several players. There were ten league victories, and an exciting winner takes all match on the last day of the season where the Esher team held its nerve to secure promotion for the second consecutive season. Congratulations to skipper, Gareth Narinesingh.

The Development XI continued to provide a useful springboard from youth to adult cricket, and the U19s won the final of the T20 competition for the fifth time in six years with the final being played at the Oval in mid-September. Our thanks for the work done behind the scenes by Glenn Harrison and Darren Helwick to bring the side together and support our young players in the summer holidays with U17, U19 and Trust league matches.

The Senior Academy girls side won the Surrey Cup for the first time, playing age group matches and also representing the club in the Ladies Surrey Slam hardball league.

The junior sides, both boys and girls, have also performed admirably, with more than 800 matches played. The reports of each section provide details of the many talented cricketers we have at the club as well as the tremendous energy and commitment that is provided by the leaders and administrators within each age-group.

Two achievements that are worthy of note are the top run scorer and top wicket taker for the club in 2025. In a competitive field Will Hamilton scored 947 runs in 24 innings, including a 50 at the Oval, and Byron Miller took 42 wickets in 38 games. Two young players with a bright future.

Congratulations to the following young players:

- Alex French for signing for Surrey and playing for England U19s.
- Oliver Hunt for making his debut for the Surrey team in the Metro Cup.

Chairman elect report

Despite all the good things, the season finished in tragedy with the dreadfully sad death of Lek, such a massive presence at the club despite the small frame for so many years.

The winter has seen much effort from our dedicated team of volunteers as they work tirelessly to ensure we are able to compete and stay compliant through 2026. My first act as interim chair is to thank each and every one of them. My second act is to thank Neil in particular for the amazing job he has done for the last three seasons, and I am delighted that he has agreed to stay on the committee as Secretary: I know I will use his wisdom and calm nature often. Considering he took over in a caretaker capacity for a few months, the commitment he has shown has been invaluable.

Report on change to charitable status-Incorporation of the Club as a Charity

Since the proposal to change of the structure of the Club from an unincorporated association to a limited company with charitable status was approved by the members at the Extraordinary General Meeting held on 1st May, the project has been completed following the approval of the Charities Commission. The change has taken place with effect from 1st January 2026.

As a reminder of the key features of this new structure:

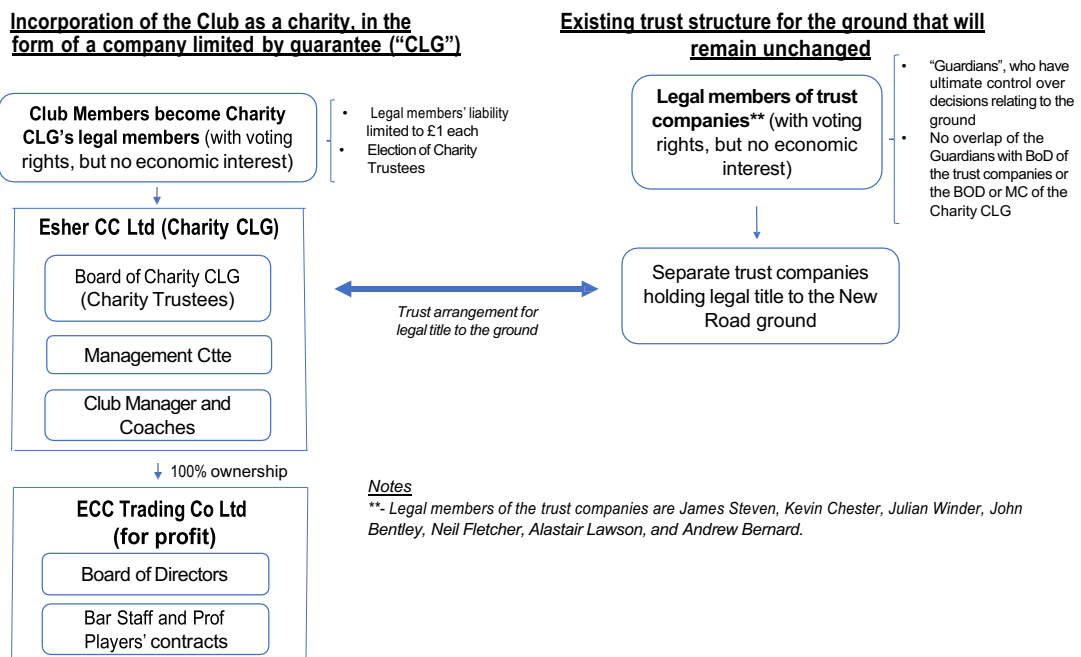
- The charity entity will be a company limited by guarantee (a “CLG”). The legal members of that company (the equivalent of shareholders) will each provide a guarantee limited to £1 and will have no other liability because of their status as the legal members.
- In line with commonly adopted practice, the charitable CLG will have a separate trading subsidiary for those activities which are not permitted to be operated from within the charity, for example the running of the bar.
- The day-to-day operations of the Club, age group and team management, training arrangements and so on will all continue unaffected by the change of legal form. Most importantly, the day-to-day management of the cricket-related activities of the Club will continue to rest with the Management Committee, with appropriate delegated authority from the trustees.
- All of the existing unincorporated association’s assets and contracts will transfer to the new charitable CLG or the trading subsidiary, depending on which part of the Club’s activities they relate to. We have been advised that there will be no tax consequences for the existing Club or its members as a result of that transfer or the transition to the new structure.
- The legal title to the ground will continue to be held on trust by two ECC Property companies, for the benefit of the charitable CLG instead of the existing Club.

To explain the key features of the governance and structure of the charitable CLG:

- All members of the Club, other than social members, will be the legal members of the charitable CLG with voting rights (but will have no economic interest in it or its assets).
- As a charity, the CLG can reclaim gift aid from the Government for the part of each subscription fee that relates to membership of the Club, providing voting rights and the right to attend the Club’s Annual General Meeting, as long as it is paid by a UK taxpayer (including parents paying for juniors). There is no cost to you. Further details will be provided during the membership process for 2026.
- One important point of detail is that, in relation to the young cricketer sections, there is a “one vote per child” approach. So, where a young cricketer is registered with the Club, both parents/guardians will continue to have the rights of social members, but only one will be a legal member of the charitable CLG. Where there are siblings registered, the relevant parent/guardian will have one vote per young cricketer.
- The charitable CLG will have a board of trustees who will oversee and be legally responsible for all the Club’s activities and compliance with the requirements of company and charity legislation. No more than three of those trustees will be members of the Management Committee (the equivalent of “executive directors”). The other trustees will be “non-executive” and provide independent oversight. All trustees will be elected by the legal members of the charitable CLG at the AGM.
- The initial board of trustees are Neil McCallum, John Woolhead and Vince Chandler, as the three executives, and David Crook, Nick Page and Geoff Ellis, as the three non-executives. Dan Taylor will replace Neil as a trustee in the new year, then all of the trustees will stand for re-election at the next AGM. After that, the executive directors will need to stand for re-election at each AGM, while the non-executives will have three-year terms and retire by rotation.

- In the normal course of events, the matters that the legal members of the charitable CLG will vote on will be confined to the election of trustees and standard General Meeting matters such as approval of the accounts, but the charitable CLG’s constitution will also require special majority approval of certain key matters by the legal members, in particular proposals regarding any sale or transfer of the interest in the ground. Any amendment to the charitable CLG’s constitution will require member approval, with a special majority being required to amend certain key provisions.
- As mentioned above, the board of trustees will delegate day-to-day management of operational and cricket-related activities of the Club to the Management Committee. The Chairman, Honorary Secretary, Honorary Treasurer and Safeguarding Officer will all be elected at the AGM. Other members of the Management Committee will be co-opted by the Chairman.
- As is the case now, our expectation is that all the trustees and members of the Management Committee (other than our General Manager, Duncan Pauline) will continue to be volunteers and not receive remuneration for performing those roles.

The Club would like to thank the project working group that has successfully completed this transition, which puts the Club on a sound footing going forward. In particular, the Club is indebted to David Crook and Nick Page, for their expertise and guidance not to mention the many hours, in making the project a success.

Treasurer's Report

For the year ended 30 September 2025

Financial Highlights

- Total income increased slightly to **£325,689.07**, reflecting continued strong participation across the club.
 - Membership income remained the club's largest and most stable revenue stream at **£175,295.78**.
 - Bar operations and facility rentals both improved compared with the previous year.
 - Higher operational and professional costs resulted in a **net deficit of £38,814.88** for the year.
 - The club continues to maintain a **strong asset base of £407,308.54**, supporting long-term stability.

Executive Summary

The financial year ending 30 September 2025 was a year of continued activity and development for Esher Cricket Club. Overall income increased slightly to **£325,689**, compared with **£318,999** in the previous year, reflecting strong membership participation and steady performance across a number of revenue streams. During the year, the club also incurred additional costs relating to professional advisory work and the ongoing maintenance of our facilities. These costs, together with increases in operational expenses, resulted in a **net deficit of £38,814** compared with a deficit of **£5,476** in the previous year. While this represents a challenging financial outcome for the year, it should be viewed in the context of the club's longer-term investment in governance, facilities and infrastructure. The club continues to benefit from a strong membership base, dedicated volunteers and a valuable asset base which together support its long-term sustainability.

Income Breakdown

Membership subscriptions and match fees remain the club's largest and most reliable source of income, generating **£175,295** during the year and continuing to form the backbone of the club's finances. Fundraising activities such as the **City Lunch and End-of-Year Ball** contributed **£30,330**, demonstrating the importance of member engagement and community support. The **bar operation produced a net contribution of £10,504**, representing a healthy improvement on the prior year. Coaching programmes, camps and tournaments generated **£37,957**, reflecting the strength of the club's junior and development programmes. Rental income from pavilion and ground hire increased to **£18,218**, while the **playgroup rental income remained a stable and valuable contribution of £32,387**. Other income streams, including coaching hire, kit sales and miscellaneous income, contributed **£9,646**. Sponsorship income declined to **£11,350**, and strengthening this area will be an important focus for the coming year.

Expenses Breakdown

Total expenditure for the year increased to **£346,188**, compared with **£298,921** in the previous year. The largest element of expenditure relates to **ground and pavilion costs totalling £125,245**, covering maintenance of the New Road and Imber Court grounds, utilities, pitch hire and pavilion operations. **Staff and player costs amounted to £65,545**, reflecting the continued investment in coaching staff, match officials and operational support necessary to run the club effectively. **Coaching and equipment costs totalled £57,854**, supporting the club's extensive junior and senior cricket programmes. Administrative costs increased to **£76,368**, largely due to professional advisory fees incurred during the year relating to the matters associated with the club's future organisational structure. These costs are largely one-off in nature. Playgroup operating costs totalled **£21,175** and relate to the nursery facilities operating within the club grounds.

Financial Stability

Despite the deficit reported this year, the club's underlying financial position remains stable. As at 30 September 2025, the club reported **net assets of £407,308**, supported by tangible assets including the pavilion, cricket square, nets and other facilities. These assets provide long-term security and support the club's cricketing activities for many years to come. Cash balances were reduced during the year largely due to higher operating expenditure; however, the club remains able to meet its financial obligations and continues to operate on a sound footing. The committee will continue to focus on maintaining prudent financial management while ensuring the club continues to invest in its facilities and cricketing programmes.

Club's Priorities for 2026

Looking ahead, the committee will focus on several key priorities:

- Strengthening sponsorship and commercial partnerships.
- Continuing to grow membership participation across junior, academy and adult cricket.
- Expanding revenue from events, facility hire and cricket development programmes.
- Maintaining careful control over operating and administrative costs.
- Supporting the club's long-term governance and organisational structure improvements.

With the continued support of members, volunteers and sponsors, the committee remains confident in the **long-term financial health and sustainability of Esher Cricket Club**.

1. Income

Income lines for Fundraising and Functions, Bar and Courses are shown net of costs. All other income lines are shown gross.

2. Depreciation

Depreciation has been charged as follows.

- Pavilion over 50 years
- Car park and pavilion surrounds over 20 years
- All other equipment over 10 years
- Kitchen, bar furniture and software over 5 years

3. Net Asset value

The Club is sole beneficiary of a trust arrangement which holds legal title to the grounds at 47 New Road, Esher, Surrey KT10 9NU.

The Club has exclusive right of use of the grounds, and the Management Committee are of the opinion that recognition of these rights in the Club's balance sheet is reasonable; this is described as Freehold

Ground and is stated at its historical cost from 1935 when the original trust was settled. The current trust is by way of two companies (limited by Guarantee) which act as trustee of the grounds.

The Club applies the historical cost principle in its accounting and reporting, and accordingly, does not revalue its assets and liabilities.

Independent Examiner's statement on the accounts

Safeguarding Report

2025 has been another positive year for Esher Cricket Club, and safeguarding continues to be a key priority as our club grows and evolves. With a large and diverse membership, we remain committed to ensuring Esher CC is a safe, inclusive and welcoming environment for everyone involved in the game.

Club Standards and National Framework

Safeguarding at Esher CC continues to be guided by the ECB's [Safe Hands](#) policy and the updated ECB Safeguarding Regulations introduced in 2025. These updates reinforce the importance of clear reporting processes, appropriate training, safer recruitment and shared responsibility across clubs, counties and the wider game.

Esher CC works closely within the safeguarding framework provided by Surrey Cricket, benefiting from county-level guidance, training opportunities and clear escalation pathways when needed.

Keeping Our Club Safe

During the 2025 season, a small number of safeguarding matters were raised. As in previous years, these were handled promptly and appropriately, following ECB and Surrey Cricket guidance. In each case, concerns were addressed sensitively and resolved, with the wellbeing of those involved remaining the priority throughout.

Thank you to players, parents, coaches and volunteers for continuing to raise concerns where needed and for supporting a culture of openness and trust across the club.

Safeguarding in Practice

With a strong junior section and increasing numbers of young players transitioning into open-age cricket, safeguarding remains an important focus. Captains and coaches continue to receive guidance on supporting junior players in adult teams, ensuring appropriate supervision, communication and inclusive behaviour.

The club also continues to uphold clear policies covering areas such as:

- [Anti-bullying](#)
- [Safe use of photography and social media](#)
- [Transport and supervision](#)
- [Reporting and whistleblowing](#)

These policies are posted on our website and are designed to support both prevention and early intervention, helping to create the right environment for everyone involved in club life.

Training and Awareness

Safeguarding training remains an important part of club activity. The ECB's online [safeguarding course](#) is an accessible way for volunteers, parents and players to build confidence in recognising concerns and knowing what to do if something doesn't feel right.

We also make sure that all our coaches are fully trained in safeguarding. We also encourage all of our volunteers to complete the basic level safeguarding training provided by the ECB and, of course, we ensure that all volunteers working with children are DBS compliant.

Looking Ahead

The above focuses on the 2025 season. As highlighted earlier in this report, since the end of the season, the club has transitioned to being both a company and a registered charity. The Charity Commission rightly emphasises the importance of safeguarding and the duty on charity trustees for the protection of beneficiaries, staff, volunteers and others encountering a charity. Our safeguarding approach going forward will take account of the [Commission's guidance](#) alongside the guidance from the ECB and Surrey Cricket referred to above.

As safeguarding expectations across cricket continue to evolve, Esher CC remains committed to embedding safeguarding into everyday club culture, not just through policies, but through behaviour, communication and shared responsibility.

1st XI report and averages

We ended the 2024 season talking about how to improve on our 4th-place finish. The message was clear - consistency as a team, turning up week after week as a set and motivated 11.

At the end of 2025, after four captains and 28 players representing the 1s, it's fair to say we didn't totally put that into practice despite huge individual efforts! From the outset, this inconsistency alongside significant injuries, made this season one of our most challenging. The goal soon became survival and speaking honestly, we rarely put in a complete team performance. Too often, we as senior players didn't stand up when needed, especially with the bat. We never quite had the same side week after week. This wasn't helped when before the season started, one of our most reliable bowlers Joe Lavender managed to put himself out for half the season by rolling his ankle while celebrating a wicket at nets!

I would note that in the long-term seasons like this can shape a team. It was evident early on that the one thing we had to do was stay up, and although we made life as hard for ourselves as possible, thanks to some brilliance, plenty of grit and a slice of luck, we pulled off the great escape to keep our Premier League status.

There were still plenty of standout moments. With the bat, Teague Wylie, David Brent and Nic Smit all produced important innings, while Don Butchart showed he could win games with both bat and ball, stepping up superbly at number six. With the ball, BT led the attack with passion and energy, in the absence of his partner in crime, Joe Lavender. Freddie H reminded us of his destructive best at Dulwich, producing a devastating spell of spin in a must-win game. We also had success beyond the 1st XI. Justin Broad showed every one of his class, scoring his debut professional hundred and leading from the front in the T20 semi-final at Edgbaston. And younger players continued to shine, with Alex French and Ollie Hunt making their Surrey debuts in the One Day Cup, while Alex Chambers announced himself with a competitive, high-class 90 in a huge chase that summed up his fighting spirit and potential as an exciting all-rounder.

The season also had moments where we simply dug deep together. Against East Molesey, one of the toughest opponents you'll meet, we were up against a strong bowling unit and quickly realised that if we couldn't win, we had to fight tooth and nail for the draw. Don showed his adaptability by batting with patience and then Freddie came in to play one of the most important knocks of our season. He fought the devil on his shoulder and proved he could dig in when it mattered most, showing he's a man full of grit and not just power. Those hard-earned points proved significant in the end.

For much of the season, our problem was setting up games with the bat. Too often the bowlers were left with little to work with, no matter how hard they tried. Then came Wimbledon away. Always a tough game, but one we relish and have found success in the last few years. That week, we made a conscious decision to change our approach with the bat. Ollie Hunt worked tirelessly through a tricky powerplay, Smit and Chambers consolidated, Freddie and Brent then cashed in with the destructive finishing we know they're capable of. It was old-school cricket: graft early, flourish late. For what felt like the first time all year we gave ourselves a platform, and the bowlers responded in kind. Ben and Joe were relentless with the new ball, and Chambers, Freddie and Don backed them up brilliantly. Everything clicked across all departments. A hard-fought win, but one that showed we had the quality to match anyone, even the team that would end up winning the league.

The following week at Reigate, missing five from that famous win, we inevitably struggled. But it opened the door for youngsters to shine. Tom Chandler gave everything in the field and looked composed with the bat. Adam Helwick impressed at the top, building on his strong 2nd XI season. And Fergus De Mestre showed why he's such an exciting prospect at a very young age.

We battled all the way to the end. Against relegation rivals Sunbury, the game could have gone either way even after they amassed a brilliant score over 300. After the weather intervened, both sides were left needing a final day win to survive. Sunbury fell short against Reigate, which meant the door was ajar. In that last game, another talented young player, Ollie Mortlock, produced a crucial spell of bowling and the runout of the season. And fittingly, it was Ben Townsend who took the winning wicket to seal survival. His celebration, dropping to his knees in sheer relief and passion, captured exactly what it meant to him, the boys and to the Club.

One thing I do want to stress is how much this group gave to the cause. Results didn't always reflect the effort, but the commitment in the middle never wavered. What makes the difference is knowing the whole Club is behind us. At times it was disappointing to hear comments made about players behind closed doors, especially when I could see the effort put in on the field. Criticism without a purpose or a useful message doesn't help, encouragement and unity does. If we stick together as players, parents, coaches and supporters, we'll only get stronger and have more fun.

And finally, this year reminded us of what really matters. We lost someone very special in Lek, who was dearly loved by the whole group. The respect shown by Clubs across Surrey cricket underlined just how widely she was valued. She will be deeply missed, but always remembered, and we'll be thinking of her when we come together again in 2026.

So yes, 2025 was tough and we have lots to improve on. But it was also a season of character, fight, and glimpses of an incredibly bright future. With so many youngsters stepping up and the squad desperate to put things right, there's plenty to be excited about for next Summer.



Player of the season: Ben Townsend

This year's Player of the Season goes to one of the hardest working cricketers I've ever played with. Ben demands nothing but the best from himself and his passion for the game is unmatched. At times that passion can boil over, but it's exactly what drives him to run in hard every over and give everything to win. As a captain, there's nothing better than having a bowler disappointed at being taken off because they want more, that hunger defines Ben. His performances throughout the season were outstanding, but none more so than his final wicket, charging in one last time to secure our place in the Premier League. Ben never misses training, using even wash outs as a chance to improve. He's central to our team (both as a bowler and as a character) and this award is a fitting recognition for someone who gave absolutely everything all season.

The 2nd XI had a fantastic season in 2025, finishing 'best of the rest' in 3rd place in what we predicted would be the highest standard of cricket the 2nd XI had played in. This came following the restructuring of the Surrey Championship leagues which placed us into Division 3 West consisting of some familiar foes and five 1st XI sides! The lads took the challenge in their stride, facing overseas ex-professional cricketers and travelling to grounds we have never played at, as we managed to win 6 out of the 10 games against the 1st teams. This proved to be integral to our success and fantastic experience for some of the younger members of the team.

The season started off with a bang against Guildford with a thriller that went down to the wire. Looking to not brood on our past experiences at Woodbridge Road, Ali Birkby lost the toss on a flat deck, and we were stuck in the field. After consistent and tight bowling from Tom Brown and Joe de la Fuente, and some heroic fielding from Matt Macpherson (yes you read that right!) we contained Guildford to 290 (129 less runs than when we last visited this ground). After a difficult start at 70/3 after 15 overs, Ali Birkby and Darren Helwick steadied the ship putting on a 150 partnership. Darren departed for a well-made 55 off 72 and was replaced by Matt Macpherson who made an important quick fire 21. However, the star of the show was Ali Birkby who made 144 not out off 132 deliveries scoring the winning runs with just two balls to spare. A great day for all involved and exactly the start we were looking for.

We were slightly up and down at the start of the season. Following a big win at Guildford, we had a tight loss to Ashted, despite great knocks from Nathan Roberts and Ali Birkby, thrashed Chertsey 1st XI by 10 wickets and then came convincingly second against East Molesey and Leatherhead. This has been the trend with the 2nd XI over the past few years, however this time we took the positive from each game and built a strong core group.

The core group consisted of several young guns who thrived in their new roles in the 2nd XI. Priyesh Patel and Adam Helwick played the most 2nd XI games out of anyone this year. Adam (U16) scored 428 runs across the season opening the batting against tricky and experienced bowlers' week in, week out. He raised the bat three times this season playing for the 2nd XI with the highlight being his 91 at New Road against Farnham 1st XI. Not only did Adam shine with the bat, but he also kept wicket for most of the games and showed terrific skill standing up to Joe de La Fuente and Dan Taylor. His performances this year didn't go unnoticed as Adam was called up to make his 1st XI debut in August. Priyesh (U16) "bucket hands" Patel played a huge role with both bat and ball. Batting at eight or nine each week Priyesh accumulated runs effectively and at pivotal times of the season. He made a fantastic 53* off just 46 balls in a close affair with Sunbury including a 50 partnership with Kei Lalor where Priyesh made 27 off just 16 balls. With the ball, Priyesh shined throughout the season as he spun a web around the opposition on multiple occasions. He was Man of the Match against East Molesey where he bowled 10 overs on the bounce taking 4-36 with three maidens and changed the game. Dan Taylor and the aforementioned Priyesh Patel bowled superbly in a pair, keeping it tight in the all-important middle overs. We bowled East Molesey out for a chaseable 184. The 3rd XI enjoyed a superb 2025 campaign, securing promotion and finishing just one win shy of the league title.

The season began shakily, with narrow defeats to Sunbury and Shepperton, both of which were lost in the final five overs. However, the side showed outstanding resilience to bounce back and win the next seven matches in a row. This run of form underlined the strength of Esher's adult cricket and the depth of talent throughout the club.

Season Highlights

Sunbury Revenge: Max Chambers, on debut, claimed 4-19 as Sunbury were bowled out for 101, the perfect response after the early-season defeat.

Home Walton Win: Charlie Green (36) and Max Simpson (36) shared a crucial partnership, backed by a clinical bowling display led by Shiv Patel (3-19).

The Title Race

By mid-season, Esher were firmly in the hunt for the title. A narrow defeat to Ham & Petersham 1st XI meant there was no margin for error, but the side responded brilliantly. Will Hamilton's imperious 89 and Austin Willman's fluent 61 powered a comfortable win over Oxshott 2nd XI, before emphatic victories against Walton-on-Thames and Balham & Tooting kept the promotion charge alive.

It all came down to a final, winner-takes-all clash with Malden Wanderers. On a pitch where runs are usually plentiful, Esher fought hard to post 183, thanks to Andrew McCallum (52) and Angus Barrett (49). Despite a spirited effort in the field, Wanderers chased the target with three overs to spare, clinching the title. Undeterred, Esher bounced back in style, sealing second place and promotion with a commanding win over Staines & Laleham, setting the stage for an exciting 2026 campaign at a higher level.

Promotion was secured, as runners up, on the final Saturday of the season. However, 4 games out we were top of the league with the league championship in our own hands but a couple of poor performances against Sunbury and Hampton Hill resulted in the need to win the final game.

It was a season of two halves; we won 9 out of the first 11 games with one abandoned. We were top of the league and looking comfortable. We then lost 3 of the next 5 again one abandoned but thanks to other teams not taking advantage we went into the final game with promotion in our own hands.

A 32-run victory probably sounds less competitive than it felt at the time. A brilliant end to what had been a traumatic week for the club.

5 Esher U11 cricketers were selected for the Surrey CCC County Age Group matches against Middlesex, at the end of the season, added to nine other boys representing Surrey on the performance pathway. LEAGUE SUMMARY

The age group entered an ambitious 6 league entries for the season – 4 Sunday and 2 midweek. Through the season we collectively played 52 out of 54 scheduled league games, winning 30 and losing 22.

Our Sunday T2 sides both finished mid-table, with the Dragons winning four, losing six and ending 4/6 in a v close league. The Phoenix finished 3/6 winning five and losing 5. The Griffins were thwarted by the weather in the away game v Teddington, finishing W5, L2, A1, ending second on H2H with Teddington. The Eagles on the other hand had a perfect season, P8, W8 to top the league.

The midweek Eagles playing in the U13 league were a highlight of the season; winning 7, losing 3 and topping the table after winning two must win games at the end to clinch the title. That 21 different boys played in the side and didn't look out of place a year up is a real credit to the depth we have in the age group.

CUP SUMMARY

Our cup run took us all the way to the final where we came close in a tight game with Reigate Priory. It was quite a run, seeing off some strong teams on the way – including a Malden Wanderers side who would have been worthy finalists and who beat us in a friendly, Thames Ditton who beat us in the league and Spencer who are always strong with plenty of performance players to call on.

Again 17 boys playing in the cup run is a testament to our depth and reflects the challenge we had in selecting the line up each round.

TOURNAMENTS

We again hosted two 8 a-side-tournaments at the club, with the highlight being the last ever one for the age group at New Road to wrap up the season which included some special moments. The Dragons put up an amazing fight to firstly set what Duncan tells me was an all age group record score of 109 runs v Merstham, then went on to beat Spencer only to miss out on 2nd place and the semis by 2 runs, and top spot in the group by 5 runs. The Griffins managed to top the group and beat Teddington and Spencer on the way to winning the event.

PERFORMANCE CRICKET

We have a remarkable number of boys who have been playing performance cricket this season, supplemented by even more who have previously and could very well still be doing so. Freddie Carswell and Samuel Callaghan went on to be selected for a number of CAG games against other counties. Well done to the two of them.

Getting all these games on through the season is a full-on team effort – from the umpiring, scoring, match managing and provision of refreshments the whole parent body has made it happen. Esher CC Girls 2025 Season Report

We hope you and your daughters enjoyed the cricket at Esher this season. All tournaments and leagues have now been completed, and we thought you might like to know that this year has been **our most successful ever** with several age groups winning their league or appearing in cup finals for the first time.

The **U5s and U6s** training was completely changed this year, with all the girls in the two-year groups training together, separate from the boys, like every other age group. The sessions, led by the wonderful Subi, were a great success, with attendance numbers going up each week! Thank you to all the parents who helped with these sessions. We are really looking forward to next year, and please tell all of your daughter's friends to come along too!

The **U7 and U8s** merged to play in several games, often winning comfortably thanks to the tireless leadership of Alex Morgan. While they didn't win their U8 Smash-it A league, there were some fabulous performances, and the group shows great potential for next year. Special thanks to all the parents in this group for helping to recruit more players - it made a big difference to the group.

The **U9s** was the biggest junior girls' group by far, with over 20 girls in the squad. Alana managed the teams and led the Dragons and Griffins to 2nd and 3rd place in the Smash-it West league. We were only pipped to first place because we had to concede a game, so all the signs suggest that this group should start winning things next year!

The **U10** group is the big transition year in cricket at Esher, with the girls switching from soft to hard ball cricket. The current group of U10s had no problem with the change and (remarkably) came second in the U10-U11 Tier 2 Central league. The **U11** group did even better by winning their Tier 2 North West league — which we think is the first league the girls' section has ever won! Both groups show amazing promise, and many thanks to James, Rachel, and Leigh for looking after everyone.

Our greatest success, however, was the **U12 girls**, who won their Tier 1A league - this is the first time we have ever won a tier 1 league in any age group. A truly amazing result which deserves huge praise to all involved - massive thanks must go to Kelly who led the team to victory.

The success almost continued in the older age groups: The **U13s and U14s** came second by the tiniest of margins in their Tier 1 West league and Tier 2 West leagues, respectively. These performances demonstrate both the astonishing quality of players in these teams and the commitment of the parents who give up so much of their time to organize the games. Many thanks to Vicky, Cameron, and Matt.

Matt also nearly led a mixed team of **U13/14/15s** to victory in the U15 Hundred final at the end of the season. His team performed superbly and looked certain to win at one point before just running out of steam at the end.

Cricket for the **U16s** and above gets a bit more complicated, with GCSE and A-level exams making team selection difficult. However, by combining the U15-U18 girls (plus some superb U13s and U14s), we have been able to enter the Surrey Women's Division 2 league along with the **Surrey Women's League Cup**. The team has played some fabulous games, the pinnacle of which was an amazing victory against Wimbledon's women's 1st team — a 'proper' women's team consisting of many twenty-something players versus our teenagers — in the semi-final of the cup. Sadly, the final against Reigate was rained off last weekend. The game has been rescheduled for the start of next season. Hopefully, we will be able to begin the year with a trophy!

We had hoped to organise an awards day for all the teams and players, but sadly we just couldn't find a date that worked. Instead, I thought I would mention a few of the many amazing performances this year - apologies if I have left out a performance that wasn't recorded on play cricket!

- Without question, the greatest bowling (ever, in the history of cricket!) was Martha Garrett who got 7 (yes, seven) wickets in two overs for no runs in an U10 **BOYS** pairs match. Apparently, the opposition were stunned into silence. Rachel Helwick also managed to get 5 wickets in a game, while Violet Davatzis managed to take 5 wickets for 10 runs in a game against Weybridge, and so bettered her previous best performance of 5 for13 (also against Weybridge!). Ella Schroder gets the award for the most wickets (20) in the season.
- Kaylee Muller takes the prize for the most runs (326) scored in the season including 52 runs against Ashtead. Raphie White deserves a special award for biggest impact in a game, scoring 15 runs from 4 balls in a super over and so winning us the bronze medal in the Esher U17 tournament. Three of the senior players scored 60 not out in one or more matches, while Grace Coleman scored 52 not out in an under 12 game and Arabella Choudhry scored 53 not out in a U13 game. Congratulations to all of these fabulous players.

Now that the season has finished, you may be surprised to hear that we are already planning for next year. We have plans for more winter nets training, details of which will be sent out soon. We also have to decide which leagues to enter for next season, and we intend to get better at planning when and where the fixtures happen — for example, we want to avoid any more matches in Dulwich for the U7/U8s (madness), and we also want to reduce the number of fixture overlaps (e.g., when the U13s and U14s play on the same day/time), as these reduce our ability to fulfil both fixtures. If you would like to help with this role, please let us know. We also need to find U6, U7, and U8 Age Group Managers so that these groups can play matches next year.

Thank you to all of you for your support during the year. The club only exists because of its members, and you have all been tremendously supportive. I would also like to thank Angus and all of the other coaches who have helped during the season - they have made a massive impact on the girls and our success during the season, and we hope that they will all return next year. Most importantly, I would like to thank the Age Group Managers, all of whom spend many, many hours making sure matches happen and supporting individual players through various challenges. None of us receive any payment or financial incentive to help with the club, so if you have a chance, please do drop them a line to say thank you too.

Finally, we really hope to see you all next season. Please come back and please try to recruit your daughter's friends, and their friends to the club. After many years of hard work, we are beginning to see the rewards. And while it is lovely to win things, our main goal is still to get as many girls as possible playing and enjoying cricket.

Lek Pauline obituary

20th November 1978 to 20th August 2025

Duncan has been overwhelmed by the number of cards and messages expressing sadness at LEK's sudden and untimely death and he would like to thank everyone for their warm and generous support.

It is clear how deeply loved LEK was and hard to believe that she will no longer be the smiling, welcoming, presence at the hatch and heart of Esher Cricket Club.

So many of the cards included words from all members of a family. Reading from just a few:

'A wonderful woman who treated children with warmth, kindness and humour. They adored her, we will always be grateful for all she did to make cricket special.'

'LEK brightened up everyone's day with her wonderful smile and infectious laughter.'

'Our children especially wanted to say how much they thought of LEK.'

'One of the happiest, kindest, most positive people.'

'One of life's genuine souls.'

'The heart of every festival.'

Duncan described LEK as a 'giver'. 'A happy, generous and kind person.'

So, LEK was simply a 'star' perhaps best remembered in one short phrase,

'LEK was a ray of sunshine.'

Duncan is both delighted and overawed by the support that he has received from the Just giving campaign. In such a very short time over 200 contributions have been made to the page set up in LEK's memory, not just from friends in Esher but also other clubs who held LEK in the highest regard.

As one message said:

'LEK will be missed by oppo like us who were privileged to enjoy the 'Pauline' hospitality at Esher.'

So, LEK was special. How did she come to be at the centre of all things Esher Cricket Club?

Wiyada was born in Surin, Thailand on 20th November 1978. Of course, we all know Wiyada as LEK or Lecky.

LEK's family are rice farmers and her mother Petch, brother Phet and his two children are joining us by live stream from a small village, 20km East of Surin. LEK's sister Jenny is also with us in Surin where she lives with her two daughters, one of whom Kimberly, who, some of you may recall, spent some time in Esher, is studying at University in Ireland.

After High School, LEK worked for a US Computer chip company in Korat. She did well and became a line manager.

LEK's production line employees called her 'Big Eye' as she didn't miss much. And having worked with LEK I know exactly what they meant.

LEK's company took management on an annual holiday and on one of these in Wah Hin she met Duncan and her life changed. She soon left her job, married Duncan in Bangkok on US Independence Day 2003 and came to Esher. How lucky we are that she did.

For 20 years LEK was at the nerve centre of everything good that happened at Esher Cricket Club. Duncan told me that she loved the club, the members and really enjoyed working there. It showed!

LEK spent countless hours behind-the-scenes from first thing in the morning to last thing at night ensuring that everything always ran smoothly both on and off the pitch. From serving behind the bar, cleaning, prettifying the ground, re-organising the furniture for the play group, 'Little Sparrows' and organising her team of Thai ladies to cater or run outside events, she never stopped smiling.

LEK's cooking was legendary. Hundreds, no thousands of lunches on festival days, brilliant breakfasts on Sundays, the best cricket teas on the circuit, tantalising Thai banquets on Friday nights and outstanding post-match meals on Saturday evenings which encouraged players to stay or come back to the club and socialise, all helped build a unique atmosphere and huge sense of community.

LEK kept a watchful eye on the children, and they all loved her. She knew them all and was never short of a kind word and often a bonus ice cream or a packet of fruit gums. Their parents loved her too.

But what was she like away from her work at Esher?

LEK was a Buddhist and regularly worshipped at the Temple in Wimbledon. Her faith imbued her sense of caring for all.

LEK's sense of fun was evident in the time she spent with her Thai girlfriends. Duncan told me that she liked to go on trips, staying with groups of friends for several days in Air B&Bs in places like Margate, Bournemouth, Brighton and even Littlehampton.

She loved to go to parties with other friends in different places, such as Surbiton or with 'The Clapham Crew' often visiting all the Thai restaurants in the area.

At Christmas Duncan and LEK would go to Berwick to be with Duncan's family, a winter highlight, often after they had spent two or three months in Thailand at the end of a busy season, relaxing and seeing her family.

It is a particular sadness to Duncan that he and LEK will not be together in a house they had recently bought in Wah Hin. Life is sometimes just not fair.

Outside the cricket season, LEK also worked in local restaurants, most recently the Korean Restaurant Kokoro where she added to her already excellent culinary skills.

There was also another important side to LEK: as well as her huge heart, she had a fierce determination, which was demonstrated admirably when 12 or so years ago Duncan was very ill in intensive care and on life support. His doctors wanted to turn the machine off, but LEK was having none of it, she pleaded with them for one more day. Duncan's reprieve was 24 hours and as the clock wound down, he started to revive with just over an hour to go. It was LEK who knew her man well enough to know that he was fighting and that kept Duncan alive.

So back to LEK's home for 20 years, Esher Cricket Club.

LEK's passing has had a deep effect on young and old. Many of the young boys and girls who adored her have not experienced death before. It has been hard for them to comprehend how something like this could happen to one so young and so full of life.

I can say this with certainty. LEK would want each one of us to be positive, to make sure that part of her legacy is that we learn from the way she lived her life.

To work hard, to be as good as we can at what we do, to have a smile on our face and to take an interest in other people.

It is only fitting that on Saturday LEK was awarded posthumously the club's most prestigious Sam Ryder Trophy, given to a person who has contributed to the life of the club far beyond the norm. LEK certainly did that, again and again.

LEK was a wonderful person, and she will be sorely missed in so many ways.

From her Buddhist faith, LEK believed that her spirit would continue after death and may be reborn. Should that be the case, wherever that may be the community will be blessed.

We love you LEK.

May you rest in Peace.

Sal Lalani obituary

Salim "Sal" M. Lalani

February 9, 1945—July 13, 2025

Salim (Sal) M. Lalani passed away at home after a courageous battle and months of hospital stays and treatments for heart failure. He was born in Nairobi, Kenya, the fourth of six children.

Growing up on the equator at nearly 6000 feet provided ample opportunities to enjoy the outdoors. It also offered opportunities to learn and engage with a multiracial and diverse community. He completed his primary and high school education in Nairobi before proceeding to university in the United Kingdom. He graduated magna cum laude from Swansea University in Wales with an honours degree in economics. He was active in college hockey, cricket and debate teams.

Upon graduation, he was offered a scholarship to pursue graduate studies in the United States at the University of Chicago, where he had the good fortune to be exposed to some eight current and future Nobel laureates in economics.

After graduating with an MBA, he pursued a career in finance, joining Bank of America's management program and being assigned to the rapidly growing international division in San Francisco. There, he met Carol Glenn, a Montana native and an officer in the Investment Securities Division. Two plus years later, they were married in 1972.

Over the next several years, Sal assumed increasingly greater responsibilities in credit, commercial, and investment banking in Singapore, Malaysia, San Francisco, the Philippines, New York, Hong Kong, and London. He and Carol, who worked in banking, enjoyed all the various experiences they shared.

After nearly 16 years, his lingering entrepreneurial urge led him to establish his own investment banking boutique, Sandown Capital Corporation, in London, England, in 1987. It remained very successful until his retirement some 30 years later. With family imperatives necessitating a move to Bozeman, he commuted to London for nearly 16 years to run the business until his retirement.

During his banking and financial career, Sal developed a reputation as the "go-to" guy for complex multinational, multi-currency undertakings.

Marking its centenary in 2020, Swansea University named 100 alumni throughout its 100-year history as the most inspiring. He was proud to be included in that list.

Over the years, he developed a passion for philanthropy and sports. Together with his wife Carol, they helped establish the Shane Lalani Center for the Arts in Livingston, the Shane Pavilion at Story Mill Park in Bozeman, the Shane Lalani Birthing Center at Livingston Memorial Hospital, and many areas at the Bozeman Hospital--all in memory of their beloved son who succumbed to Type 1 diabetes at age 24.

Sal and Carol had a passion for human rights around the world, helping to fund underprivileged students, particularly women who were restricted or denied access to education
